For everyone over 18, you should receive your per capita checks very soon! If you have not received yours by Sept. 10, 1999, please contact Lisa Norton. If you don't have a good address on file with the Enrollment Department, a check will **not** be mailed to you until you update your address.

The following people are believed to be deceased. Someone who has knowledge of them needs to contact this department by **Dec. 15, 1999**. If no one has contacted us by that time, these individuals will be removed from the tribal rolls. This means they will not be eligible for per capita or any other tribal benefit unless they re-enroll.

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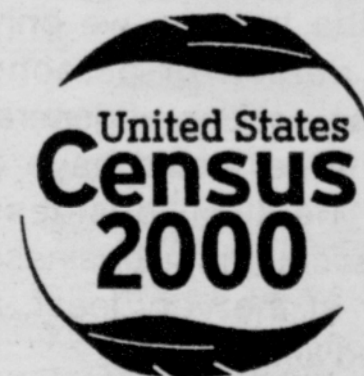
Five Big Reasons Why You Should Fill Out the Census Form

1. Help Your Community Thrive. Does your reservation or Indian community have elderly people living alone? Overcrowded schools? Census numbers can help your community work out improvement strategies.
2. Get Help in Times of Need. Many 911 emergency systems are based on maps developed for the last census. Census information helps health providers predict the spread of disease through communities with children or elderly people. When floods, tornadoes or earthquakes hit, the census tells rescuers how many people will need their help.

The 1990 census indicated that 39 percent of American Indians and Alaska Natives were less than 20 years old, compared with only 29 percent of the total U.S. population.
