- < Communicate group progress with program staff
- < Make recommendations to management for developing staff and program partnerships

Strategy C: Update the training report to create a pool of inservice trainers to provide inservice training opportunities at all staff meetings and other tribally sponsored activities.

GOAL THREE: Establish clear and consistent, enforceable policies regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs in tribal facilities, on tribal property, and during tribally sponsored activities.

Strategy A: Establish a tribal ordinance by the year 2000 to address tobacco use by minors in tribal facilities, on tribal property, and during tribally sponsored activities.

Strategy B: Establish a tribal ordinance by the year 2000 to address the use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs by adults (chaperones, volunteers, and employees) in tribal facilities, on tribal property, and during tribally sponsored activities.

Strategy C: Review and update tribal ordinances by the year 2000 regarding the use of alcohol and other drugs by minors in tribal facilities, on tribal property, and during tribally sponsored activities.

Strategy D: Implement the Citizen's Accountability Board (CAB) in Lincoln, Lane, Marion, and Multnomah counties by the year 2000.

Strategy E: Expand employee orientation to include tribal ordinances and policies regarding minor and adult use of ATOD.

Strategy F: Review and update tribal ordinances regarding tobacco use on tribal property resulting in the posting of designated smoking areas by December 1999.

Strategy G: Review and update the employee assistance and drug-free workplace personnel policies by the year 2000 regarding the use of alcohol and other drugs to assure policy effectiveness and compliance.

GOAL FOUR: Design and implement prevention programs to address the diverse cultural needs of the Siletz tribal community.

Strategy A: Provide five Mending the Circle activities to the Siletz tribal community by June, 2000, to educate adults about the risk and protective factors that contribute to youth ATOD use and related problems, and provide youth with an opportunity to make a difference in their communities.

Strategy B: Expand the use and availability of the wilderness and ropes programs to include youth, adults, and staff within the tribal community, including the entire tribal service area by December 1999.

Strategy C: Utilize opportunities provided by tribally sponsored activities to promote alcohol, tobacco, and other drug prevention efforts, including presentations, discussions, literature, and Talking Circles.

Strategy D: Develop a slogan and media campaign by the year 2000, focusing on tribal members whose death was the result of alcohol and other drug use.

Strategy E: Provide weekly in-school support groups and education to Siletz Middle School, Toledo High School, and the Siletz Alternative School, including Lifeskills, refusal skills, and leadership training.

Strategy F: Increase in-school support groups and education to Siletz Middle School, Toledo High School, and the Siletz Alternative School to include community health advocates, other available health staff, and tribal staff counselors by September 2000.

Strategy G: Seek funding to develop and support a mentorship program that trains and provides mentors for tribal youth.

GOAL FIVE: Provide prevention services to tribal members and their families throughout the 11-county service area by 2001.

Strategy A: Seek funding to support an additional staff position to provide ATOD prevention services in Eugene, Salem, and Portland area offices.
