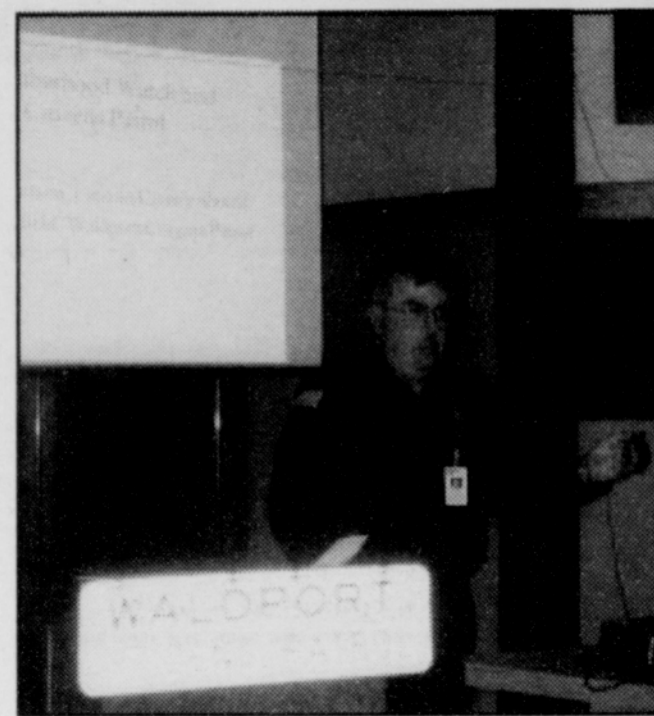

Time to Gather Basket-Making Materials

Spring is here and very soon hazel sticks will be ready to pick and peel.

Hazel stick gathering is a must for anyone interested in making traditional Siletz baskets. Spruce root can be dug all year round and is used for the weavers or weft of Siletz baskets. Bear grass and maidenhair fern are used for overlay to make our traditional designs or marks in our baskets and both are picked in late summer.

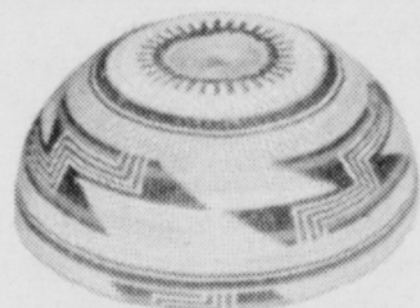

July – Fir sticks, spruce roots, bear grass, maidenhair fern

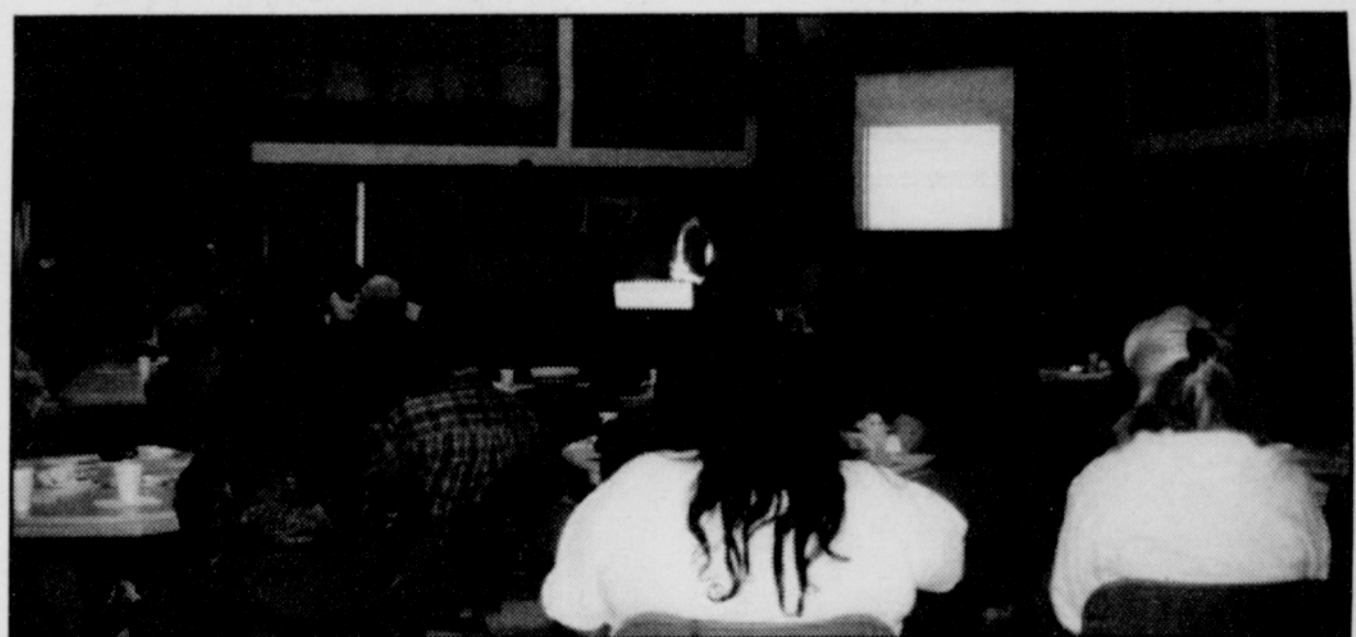
August – Fir sticks, spruce roots, bear grass, maidenhair fern, hazel sticks (limited), willow sticks

September – Bear grass, maidenhair fern, woodwardia fern, spruce roots

Awareness of Drugs and Illegal Activity Increases in Siletz
