Come to the Super Bowl Party

Chinook Winds Casino Resort will host its annual Super Bowl viewing party inside our convention center Feb. 5, 2006.

The game will be broadcast live from Ford Field, in Detroit, Mich., and is the 40th Super Bowl game. Super Bowl XL will be the second one played in the Motor City. The first was Super Bowl XVI, when Joe Montana helped claim the first Lombardi Trophy for the San Francisco 49ers.

Where: Convention Center on multiple giant screens. Everyone must be age 21 or older. Tickets: \$10 for the general public (employees not eligible to win any drawing or Game Day Million cards).

When: Doors will open at 2 p.m. Game time is 3 p.m.

Food & Beverage: "Stadium-style" food will be available, as well as beverage specials throughout the game.

Prizes Drawings: A two-part ticket

will be given to each guest with initial entry and with every beverage purchased. It will be used for drawings that include \$1,000 at the end of first quarter, \$1,000 at halftime, and \$1,000 at the end of third quarter, plus Super Bowl memorabilia throughout the game. The first 200 people in the door will receive a Super Bowl cap.

Super Bowl Game Day Cards: One Game Day "Scratch It" Card will be given to each person as they enter the party. These cards replace the classic squares board.

On each card will be four "two-number combinations," one number combination for each quarter. To win a prize, a game piece must have the correct last digit of the score for both teams at the end of each quarter. Here are the prizes in order:

- Win any one quarter: \$50
- Win any two quarters: \$100
- Win any three quarters: \$1,000
- Win all four quarters: \$100,000



Foreigner

Foreigner in Concert

Tickets are on sale now to see the hit band Foreigner at Chinook Winds Casino Resort on Feb. 24-25.

This legendary rock band will perform top-10 songs like *Urgent*, *Double Vision*, *I Want To Know What Love Is*, and many more. You won't be able to stay in your seat as band members bring back old memories and start some new ones with their ever-popular songs.

Formed in 1976, the band was made up of experienced British musicians Mick Jones and Ian McDonald, and four relative newcomers to the arena of major rock – British musician Dennis Elliott and Americans Ed Gagliardi, Lou Gramm, and Alan Greenwood.

Less than a year after getting together, the six released their first album, *Foreigner* (March 7, 1977), and within months had two top-10 hit singles.

The band soon went back to the studio to write and record its second album, *Double Vision* (June 20, 1978). Once again, they experienced surprising success and two more top-10 singles. All this while their first album was still on the national charts!

A year later, their third album, *Head Games* (Sept. 11, 1979), hit the charts and produced two more hit singles. Surrounded by controversy at the time and considered a failure for the band, *Head Games* went on to sell 5 million copies in the U.S. alone.

In 2002, the 25th anniversary brought affirmation of the enduring respect for Foreigner recordings with Rhino Entertainment re-issuing the 1977-1981 multi-platinum albums in special enhanced formats. *Foreigner*, *Double Vision*, *Head Games*, and 4 received the loving attention of Rhino's staff and bloomed again with new photos and liner notes, and bonus tracks of previously unreleased material.

New *Greatest Hits* albums also were produced in the U.S. and in Europe. And in 2001, the Warner Music Group selected *Foreigner* and 4 to be among the first group of albums from its catalog to be remastered and released in the new DVD audio format.

Ticket prices for the Foreigner concert range from \$20 to \$35. Show time is 8 p.m. each night.

Lee Ann Womack Brings Hit Country Songs to Chinook Winds

Lee Ann Womack and her hick-hop country voice are coming to Chinook Winds Casino Resort on Feb. 10-11. This multiple Grammy winner is making headlines everywhere so you won't want to miss her performances.

Hit songs like *There's More Where That Came From* and *I May Hate Myself In The Morning* are signatures that will keep you wanting more.

Somewhere between the blush of a new love and the bruises of a broken heart lies real life and real country music. Womack is a lifelong student of this reality, majoring in Jones and Wynette and graduating with honors, with the tender yet tough spirit of her teachers, who include Dolly Parton and Loretta Lynn.

There's More Where That Came From – the follow-up to her 2004 *Greatest Hits* collection – is for everyone who's ever loved, lost, learned hard-earned lessons, and lived to tell about it, including the singer herself.

"These are songs that aren't afraid to tell the truth," says Womack. "It is definitely honest music as far as the lyrics go. They're a slice of life – the good, bad, and the ugly."

It's not an accident that the album's first single, *I May Hate Myself In The Morning*, sounds simultaneously like a classic country cheatin' song and a contemporary breath of fresh air.

"This is the kind of stuff I grew up listening to," says the daughter of an east Texas country deejay, who practically wore out her father's vinyl records, soaking up every vocal lick and turn of a phrase like a sponge.

"How true is this song?" exclaims Womack. "Even if you haven't been in that situation, we all know somebody who has. It's just honest."

"You know, the sad thing is, I always felt like I was born too late," she admits. "Even when I was younger, I had an old soul. I chose these kinds of songs early on in my career but if anything, I'm more able to relate to these kinds of lyrics more now than before," says the woman whose 2000 single *I Hope You Dance* made her known around the world.

Make your way to watch this country music diva who has gone back to her down-home country roots.
