

Legal Aid Available in Rural Oregon

Services: Legal Aid Services received a two-year grant to help survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, and stalking. The grant covers rural service areas of the tribe: Clackamas, Linn, Benton, Washington, Yamhill, Tillamook, and Lincoln counties.

We can help survivors with a variety of civil legal needs, not just protective orders. For example, we can help with housing issues, divorce, custody, child support, public benefits, and more.

The definitions used by the grantor are very broad. For example, domestic violence can include emotional abuse and intimidation. Some folks who are not able to get a restraining order under Oregon or tribal law may still be able to get our help.

Referrals: Tribal members can call 1-800-222-3884 or 541-265-5305 for more information. Even if the tribal member lives in a county not listed above, they are welcome to call for information about nearby resources that still may be able to help.

The Lincoln County Office will take initial calls to get information, determine any deadlines, and provide emergency safety planning, and then plan for further services from other offices.

31st Annual American Indian Film Festival

As the nation's oldest and most prestigious venue for American Indian film arts and entertainment, the American Indian Film Festival has earned a reputation for excellence and integrity.

At Film Festival 2005, AIFI premiered and/or screened 70 film and video works from American and Canadian filmmakers. The annual Film Festival and American Indian Motion Picture Awards Show, produced by AIFI founder and president Michael Smith, draws audiences of nearly 5,000 anticipating the latest in American Indian film, video, and music.

The 2006 American Indian Film Festival will be presented Nov. 4-11 in San Francisco. Films to be entered for competition should be by or about American Indian or Canada First Nations people produced during 2005-2006.

The major categories for competition are: Documentary Feature, Documentary Short, Feature Film, Live Short Subject, Music Video, Animated Short Subject, Public Services, and Industrial.

A film jury, designated by the American Indian Film Institute, will screen entries and issue recommendations for the film program and award nominations.

The American Indian Motion Picture Awards, recognizing outstanding Indian cinematic accomplishments, will be presented the evening of Nov. 11.

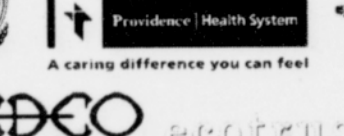


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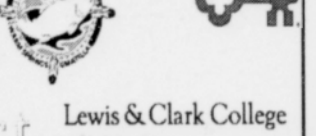

Education Department Seeks Help with Community Meetings

The Gates Foundation awarded the Oregon Department of Education a \$1.75 million grant to support statewide efforts to redesign high schools in Oregon and address PreK-20 systemic improvements.

Assemble a Disaster Supplies Kit

In the event you need to evacuate at a moment's notice and take essentials with you, you probably will not have the opportunity to shop or search for the supplies you and your family will need. Every household should assemble a disaster supplies kit and keep it up to date.

A disaster supplies kit is a collection of basic items a family would probably need to stay safe and be more comfortable during and after a disaster. Disaster supplies kit items should be stored in a portable container(s) as close as possible to the exit door.

Review the contents of your kit at least once per year or as your family needs change.

Also, consider having emergency supplies in each vehicle and at your place of employment.

- ☐ Three-day supply of nonperishable food and manual can opener
- ☐ Three-day supply of water (one gallon of water per person, per day)
- ☐ Portable battery-powered radio or television and extra batteries
- ☐ Flashlight and extra batteries
- ☐ First aid kit and manual
- ☐ Sanitation and hygiene items (hand sanitizer, moist towelettes, and toilet paper)
- ☐ Matches in waterproof container
- ☐ Whistle
- ☐ Extra clothing and blankets
- ☐ Kitchen accessories and cooking utensils
- ☐ Photocopies of identification and credit cards
- ☐ Cash and coins
- ☐ Special needs items, such as prescription medications, eye glasses,

contact lens solution, and hearing aid batteries

- ☐ Items for infants, such as formula, diapers, bottles, and pacifiers
- ☐ Tools, pet supplies, a map of the local area, and other items to meet your unique family needs

If you live in a cold climate, you must think about warmth. It's possible that you will not have heat during or after a disaster. Think about your clothing and bedding needs. Be sure to include one set of the following for each person:

- ☐ Jacket or coat
- ☐ Long pants and long-sleeve shirt
- ☐ Sturdy shoes
- ☐ Hat, mittens, and scarf
- ☐ Sleeping bag or warm blanket

Supplies for your vehicle include:

- ☐ Flashlight, extra batteries, and maps
- ☐ First aid kit and manual
- ☐ White distress flag
- ☐ Tire repair kit, booster/jumper cables, pump, and flares
- ☐ Bottled water and non-perishable foods, such as granola bars
- ☐ Seasonal supplies: winter – blanket, hat, mittens, shovel, sand, tire chains, windshield scraper, florescent distress flag; summer – sunscreen lotion (SPF 15 or greater), shade item (umbrella, wide brimmed hat, etc)
