All classes begin at 6 p.m., are two hours long, and are held in the S.T.A.N. Training Center located in the Siletz Tribal Business Corporation office, 2120 NW 44th St., Suite D, in Lincoln City, Ore.

Even if it has been a long time since you have been in school or taken a class, S.T.A.N. workshops allow students to learn at their own pace in a relaxed environment.

How Responsible Are You?

One of the personality traits that will help you to be successful as either an employee or a business owner is your sense of responsibility.

Although for some people acting in a responsible way has been a part of their lives since childhood, there are others who are only as responsible as their employer or family obligations make them.

Accepting responsibility for your own actions is an important part of how people perceive you as an individual. If you are a responsible person, others know they can depend on you to do what you say you are going to do.

For instance:

- If you tell your employer or a customer that you are going to take care of something for them – do you? Or does someone like your boss have to keep reminding you?
- If you promise someone that you are going to help them with a project, are you true to your word and follow through?
- If you register to attend a S.T.A.N. class and something comes up, do you call and let the program know you don't plan to be there? By pre-registering, the instructor saves a spot for you in the class and if you don't show up, you may be keeping someone else who wanted to attend from doing so.

Responsibility, whether it's to your family, friends, employers, or customers all identifies you as a "trusted" person, someone who does what they say they are going to do and takes pride in doing so.
