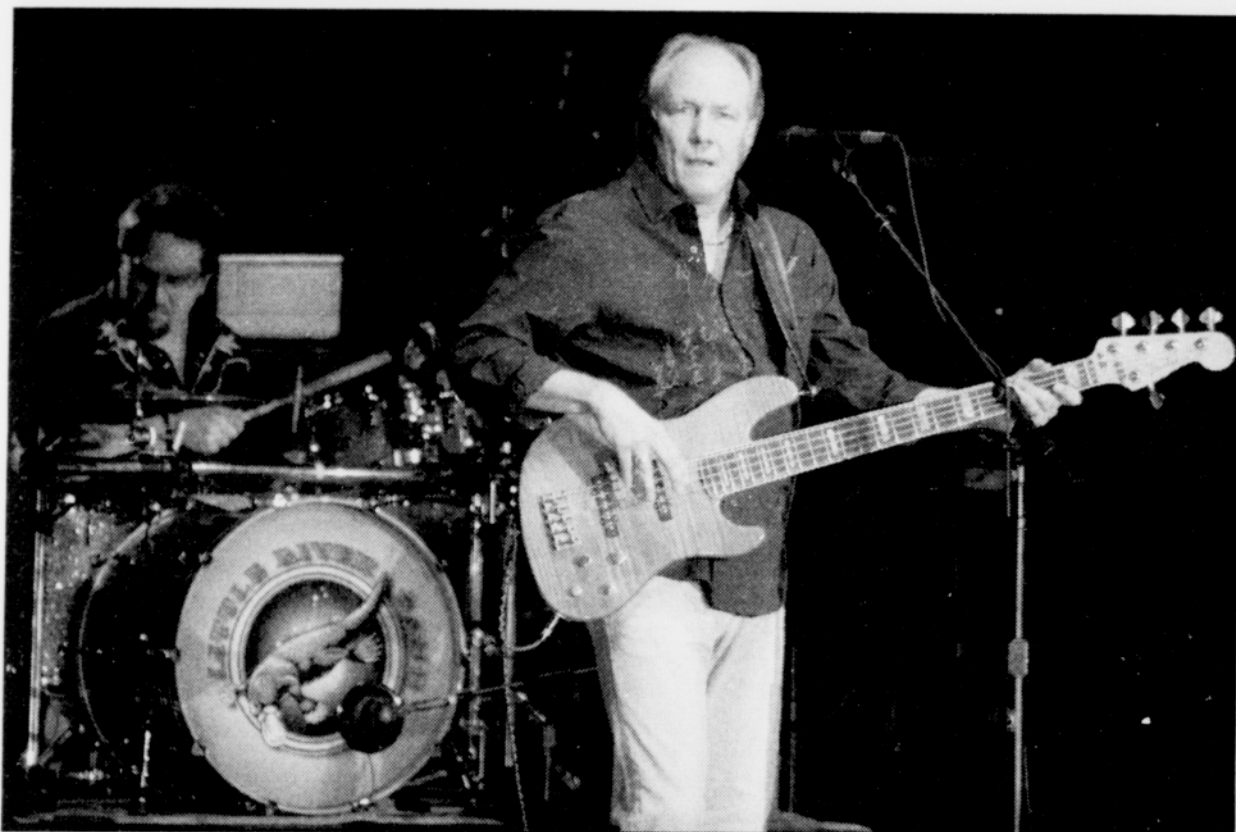
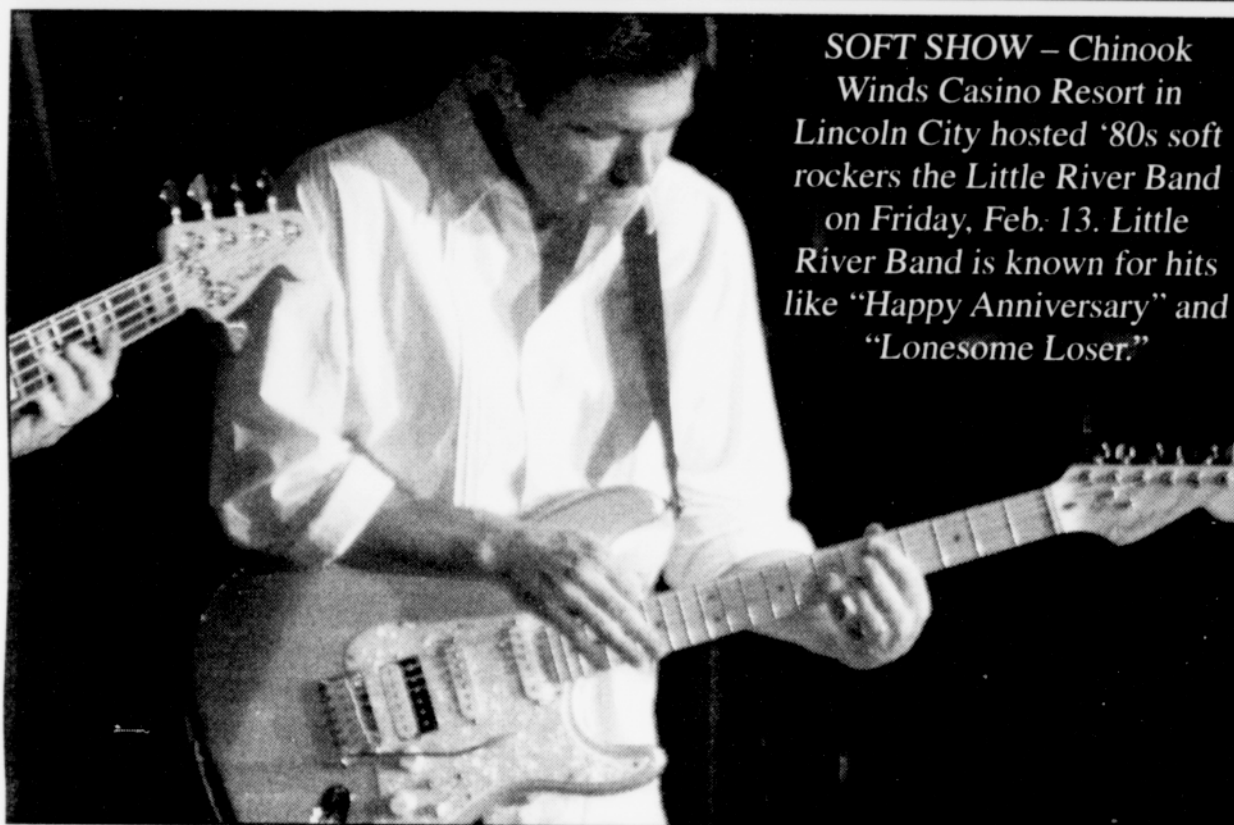

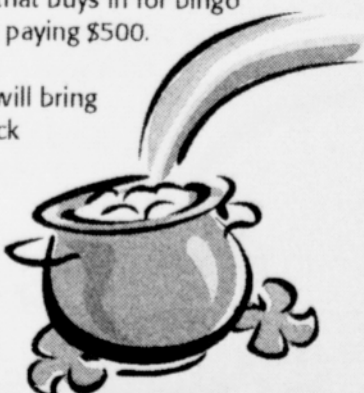

I am writing today to share my opinion about the proposal to serve alcohol on the gaming floor at Chinook Winds Casino.

As a Siletz Tribal member I find that proposal unacceptable. Alcohol was one of the first weapons used against Native Americans by the Europeans. It continues to destroy lives, families and communities across Indian Country today. A recent study found that one in 10 Native American deaths is alcohol-related.

I find it repugnant that we are proposing to ply our customers (many of whom are fellow Indians) with alcohol to reduce their inhibitions in the hopes that they will make riskier decisions with their money while gaming. I do not want to make money that way.

We as a people should make the morally and socially responsible decision to not serve alcohol at our casino. If prostitution was legal in Oregon, would we be proposing a new brothel as well? We'd sure make money, but at what price?

Just say no to alcohol at our casino!

Congratulations to Lisa Brown on her sensational victory in this year's Tribal Council election! The fact that she received over 400 votes this year demonstrates that many Tribal members now strongly support Lisa's agenda for change.

I worked hard to get Lisa elected because she is such an inspiration to me. A few years ago I didn't think there were many who understood how ineffectively their Tribal government was serving them and I didn't think anyone was willing to put in the effort to truly inform Tribal members. Then I met Lisa Brown.

I saw her work tirelessly on behalf of Tribal members every day. I saw her attending every meeting she could make and then delivering the straight story to members one by one. And I saw her take courageous stands when great pressure was brought to bear on her for rocking the boat. Her brave example inspired me to take my own stand.

The magnitude of Lisa Brown's stunning victory this year marks a decisive turning point for our Tribe. We require the transparency in our government and our businesses that will give Tribal members meaningful oversight so that the wisdom of our whole Tribe can be brought to bear on the challenges we face. I have no doubt that Lisa Brown will take the first strong steps to deliver that result.

This victory is just the beginning.
