Lakeside Housing Nears Completion

Construction on the long-awaited housing units known as Lakeside Village is moving along and it's anticipated that residents can start occupying these apartments in the next few months.

According to Robert Smith, development and modernization coordinator for the Siletz Tribal Housing Department, the Lakeside Village Affordable Housing Development in Lincoln City, Ore., consists of 20 apartments for low-income American Indians, including:

- Eight three-bedroom, two-bath apartments in a two-story building
- Eight two-bedroom, two-bath apartments in a two-story building
- Four two-bedroom, one-bath apartments in a single-story building (two of these units are ADA compliant) with concrete ramps in front



All units have decks or porches with hand railings, forced-air furnaces, dishwashers, refrigerators and electric ranges.

The 16 apartments in the eight-plex units (photo below left) have stackable washers and driers located within the apartments. The four single-story units (photo below right) have side-by-side washer and dryer hook-ups in the garage.

All units have a single-car garage. The eight-plex units have separate garage buildings with four garages per building.

Mailboxes will be on site in two different locations.

Potential residents are being chosen from an existing waiting list for rental units at the Siletz Tribal Housing Department. Please call 541-444-8322 or 800-922-1399, ext. 1322, if you would like additional information.

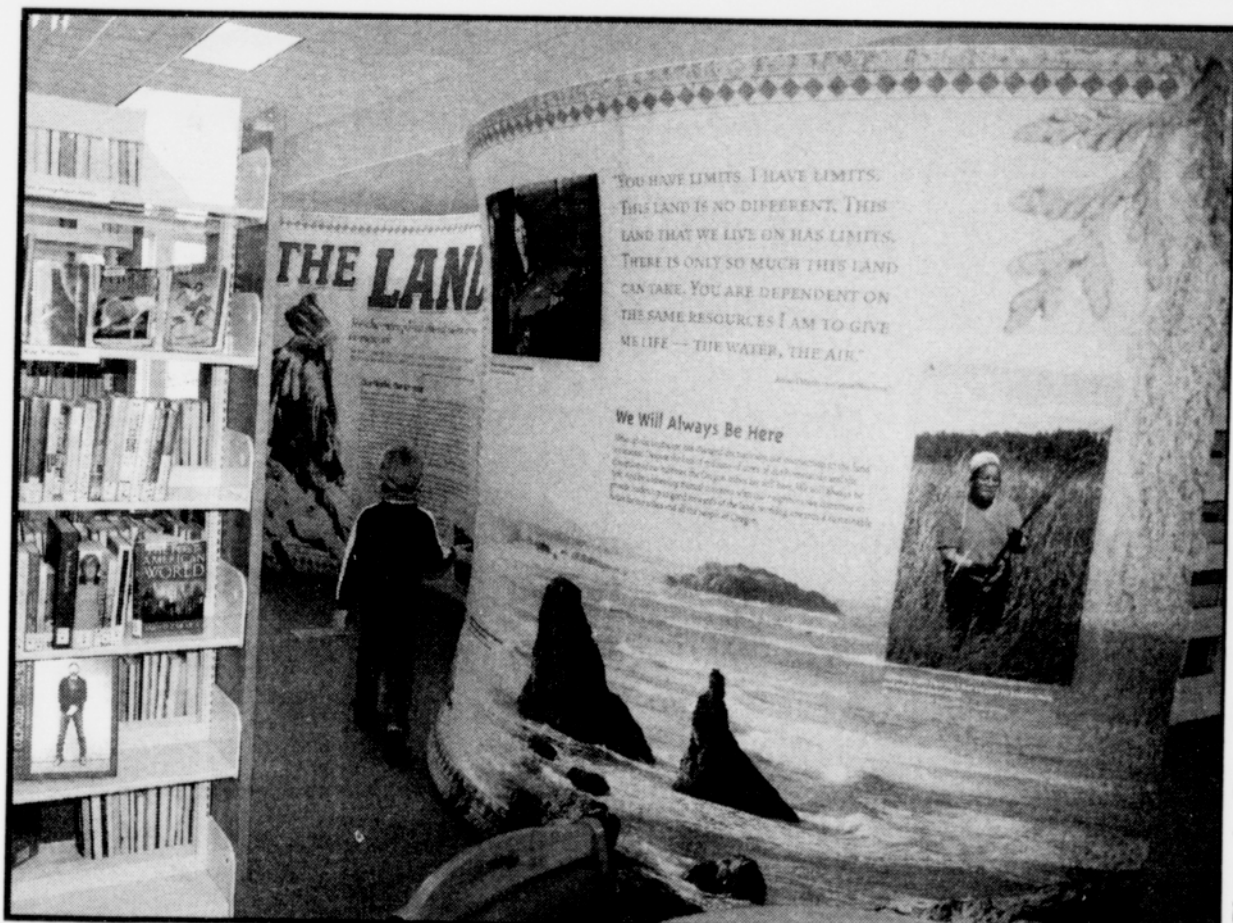
