



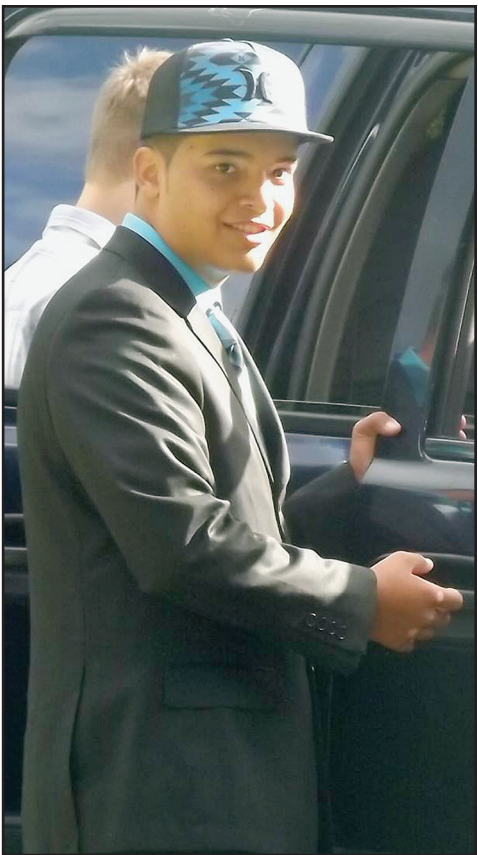
Happy 4th Birthday, Jalen, and Happy 24th Birthday, Justin.
