Involved with the Illinois Valley Senior Center for many years, she was in charge of Wednesday Night Bingo until recently, and did a lot of volunteer work for it. During the bingo games on Wednesday, Oct. 9, an impromptu collection netted \$267 in her memory for Evergreen school.

She enjoyed plastic canvas needlework, music, reading, the beach, sorority meetings and activities, and her volunteer work at I.V. Senior Center.

Survivors include two sisters, Betty Smittle, of Albuquerque, N.M., and Deon Jenkins, of White City, Ore.; a brother, Jerry Patrick, of New Mexico; and many nieces and nephews.

'Gene' Vandermark

Eugene "Gene" Vandermark, 80, of Selma died on Monday, Oct. 7, 2002 at his home.

Mr. Vandermark was born on April 19, 1922, the second child of Leslie and Clara (Hower) Vandermark, in the same Berwick, Penn. house as his father and grandfather. He is an antecedent of Sgt. Alvin York, a World War I hero.

As a young man he sang in a roving church choir visiting Berwick area churches on Sundays. For four years during World War II he served in the U.S. Army, ending with a rank of sergeant. On June 5, 1943 at McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento, he married his wife of 59 years, Dora Lee (Dodie) Vandermark, who survives.

After finishing his enlistment in the service they moved to Riverside, Calif., where he worked as a baker, foundry man, plumber, police officer (in California and later in Oregon), and a meat cutter.

In 1972 the Vandermark family moved from Riverside to Selma, where they opened Der Pinxster Hausen Family Restaurant (where Selma

Quick Stop is now) where John Wayne was one of their memorable patrons during the filming of "Rooster Cogburn." After the cafe closed he owned and operated Van's Custom Cutting, and then worked for many valley businesses.

After he retired as a meat cutter the Vandermarks started I.V. Open Door in Selma in 1995. It helps many people in need throughout this area with food and clothing.

He had been a member of Illinois Valley Lions Club. He enjoyed his family, and helping other people.

Surviving are his wife, "Dodie" Vandermark, of Selma; a sister, Dorothy Keifer; two brothers, Ray Vandermark and Roger Vandermark, all of Pennsylvania; three daughters, Frieda Mortan, of Riverside, Vicki Jones, of Selma, and Genie Gilliam, of Brookings, Ore.; 10 grand-children; numerous greatgrandchildren; and many nieces and nephews.

The Lord's Prayer, and Lightbearers.




