'Child Passenger Safety Week' goal to save lives

This year's "Child Passenger Safety Week," begins Sunday, Feb. 9 and is a national event aimed at saving young people from injury and death in car crashes - the leading cause of unintentional death and injury for children up to age 14.

The national observance runs concurrently with a two-week "Three Flags Campaign" enforcement blitz, scheduled February 10-23. Both are good reasons to make sure children are riding in properly installed, federally approved child safety or booster seats as required by Oregon law.

During the Three Flags blitz, 26 county sheriff's departments, 71 city police departments and the Oregon State Police will set up enforcement of safety belt and child safety seat laws.

In Oregon, drivers are responsible for making sure their passengers younger than age 15 are correctly restrained in a safety belt or child safety seat.

The law also requires that children between 4-and 6-years-old and weighing between 40 and 60 lbs. ride in booster seats which elevate them so the lap/shoulder belt fits correctly. Children younger than 4 or weighing less tan 40 pounds must be in child safety seats.

National Child Passenger Safety Week's education campaign promotes the following "4 Steps for Kids" from the U.S. Dept. of Transportation.

> 1. Rear-facing seats in the back seat from birth to at least one-

year-old and 20 pounds, longer if possible.

- 2. Forward-facing toddler seats in back seat from age one to approximately age four and 20 to 40 pounds.
- 3. Booster seats in the back seat from approximately age four and 40 pounds, until the seat belt fits correctly, usually at least age 8 or 4-feet, 9-inches.
- 4. Seat belts at age eight or older, or taller than 4-feet, 9-inches.
- 5. All children 12 and younger should ride in the back seat.

While these national recommendations emphasize the importance of back seating and proper types of child restraints, Levinski adds that it is equally important for drivers to properly use and maintain their vehicle safety belt systems.

After boarding a ship to Tarshish in Spain a terrible storm came up and he was cast into the sea by the frightened sailors. After his horrendous experience with the whale, Jonah hurried back and preached repentance to the people of Nineveh and they repented. God answers the prayers of those who call upon him.


their quiet influence to bring
