Two of the readings on Sunday spoke about lepers. In Leviticus, a leper was considered to be unclean and had to dwell apart from others, "making his abode outside the camp." In the gospel of Mark, Jesus cured a man with leprosy and told him not to tell anyone, but to present himself to the priest. Of course, the man couldn't keep the healing to himself and went about publicizing the matter.

In this case, it was Jesus who had to remain outside because people kept coming to him. Jesus cured the leper, not for his benefit, but for the glory of God. He wasn't looking for recognition or reward for performing such an act of compassion. Thus it should be for us as Christians - to do good for others without expecting anything in return.

It should not come as a surprise that many people caught up in the modern ideology of post-modernism think that the gospel of Jesus is irrelevant nonsense. Pastor Premdas addressed this matter in his sermon this weekend.

The Apostle Paul encountered a similar problem in the church he had founded in the city of Corinth back in A.D. 57. Corinth was a bustling commercial center whose population consisted of distinct components of Romans, Jews, and Greeks each with their characteristic religious identification.

I Corinthians 1:17-30 (we used the TEV) is the first part of Paul's answer to the criticism that his preaching lacked the sophistication necessary. Here he admitted his simple preaching of the Cross of Christ seemed to be nonsense, but that is what Christ commissioned him to preach. Philosophy, he said, may sound wise to the worldly, but it is with God.


Mrs. Parsons loved to work in her flower garden and do crafts. She was an excellent artist and enjoyed oil painting. She also loved playing video poker and solitaire.
