Volunteer group spruces up CJ cemetery

Laurel Cemetery has some cleaner gravesites, fewer fallen leaves, and less trash, thanks to a visit from a Lorna Byrne Middle School (LBMS) group who have been studying the Mexican tradition, The Day of the Dead, which honors and celebrates the lives of the dead.

On Oct. 28, armed with leaf rakes, trash bags, and a whisk broom, the group of seventh-graders and a few adults worked through a large portion of the cemetery, being careful not to disturb graves.

Reading headstones and observing gravesites offered insights into history. The first person buried in Laurel Cemetery was Henrietta Ann Hendershott, a girl who lived from October 1861 to November 1862. Henrietta was one of many very young children buried in the cemetery in the 1800s.
