Community Bible group builds homes in Mexico

Driving more than 2,000 miles to build houses in Mexico equals labors of love by an energetic group of Christians from Community Bible Church in Cave Junction.

The group, “mostly middle-aged,” has chosen for the past eight years to gather funds from Community Bible; and spend their own money for transportation, fuel and expenses to build a house for a poor Mexican family.

Habitat for Humanity has erected homes for deserving families in this country for years, “But our ambitious church holds garage sales, and lunches at which the women donate shoe boxes filled with personal and useful items to give the families who are the recipients of Christian good will.”

Toys, stuffed animals, tools, clothing and various household items are crammed into cars and pickup trucks to be distributed when each house is finished.

Many people, including Dave and Diane Gilmore, Pat Allison, Phyllis Saffer and Tom Rogers give up vacation time; willingly accept menial tasks; and struggle with the language -- “all for the joy of spreading happiness and kindness to less-

fortunate people.

“The last day is spent in prayer with the new families: Tears of joy and happiness flow in gratitude for the recipients and workers.”

This October marked the ninth annual excursion “to serve the Lord by serving others.”

The Community Bible Church group built a home in Tecate, Baja California, Mexico for a couple, both 35, who have two boys, 4 and 6.

The father, a bricklayer, earns the equivalent of \$82 per 48-hour work week. They lived in Tijuana for seven years prior to relocating to Tecate.

They were living in a “house” built of 16-by-16-foot garage doors with a roof of plywood scrap and rolled roofing. Neither the walls nor roof were secure, and the floor was dirt.

They had electricity, but no running water nor sewer.

Backing tips

Backing a vehicle is dangerous because drivers cannot see what is immediately behind them, said Oregon Driver & Motor Vehicle Services.

“Before you back up,” said DMV, “be sure it is safe and that it will not interfere with other traffic.

“It is a good idea to go behind your vehicle to make sure that a child, pet or toy is not in the way. Back slowly from a driveway onto a street.

“Turn our head,” said DMV, “so that you can look through the rear window. Do not depend on your mirrors. Be on the lookout for children, pedestrians and bicyclists behind your vehicle or on a sidewalk.”

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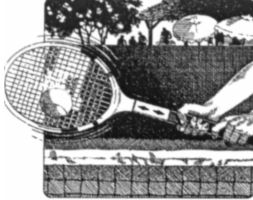
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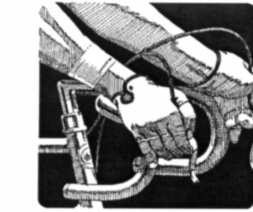

Legislation for dying patients

As part of his continuing efforts “to improve health care for all Americans,” U.S. Sen. Ron Wyden (D-Ore.) introduced two pieces of legislation aimed at providing better care options for dying patients.

The first Wyden bill, the Palliative Care Training Act, “recognizes the need for a larger pool of health-care professionals who know how to help termi-

nally ill patients to have a better quality of life.”

The second bill, the Medicare Hospice Demonstration Act, seeks to test ways to improve the Medicare hospice benefit.

“Our health-care system is structured to cure, but it often neglects how to make dying patients and their families more comfortable,” said Wyden describing his feelings.
