ODOT notes winter travel aid

Winter travel information can save motorists the hassle of driving for miles only to find that a route is closed or congested.

The Oregon Dept. of Transportation (ODOT) offers travel information via the Internet, by phone, and on cable television.

Visit TripCheck.com, ODOT's travel information website. Besides text-based reports, the site offers camera images from urban areas, mountain passes, and other key locations throughout the state. Maps detail road conditions and trouble spots and include information about weather, road construction, maintenance work, and traffic incidents.

TripCheck.com has links to bus, airport, train, bicycle, and trucking information. A mileage calculator allows estimating distance and choosing the most direct route. Other features include detailed information on scenic byways, safety rest areas, and SnoParks.

Motorists and traffic safety advocates can access a wide array of information on winter driving at egov.oregon.gov/ODOT/COMM/winter.shtml. Topics include studded tires, chains, driving in adverse weather, winter cycling, snow signs, and winter road maintenance.

Travelers in Oregon can dial 511 to access Trip Check road and weather information by phone. Drivers can select updated reports about road conditions by highway, mountain pass, or major city from easy-to-use menus. The 511 system is user-friendly. The number is easy to remember and dial, and responds to voice as well as touch tone commands.

Calls to 511 are local calls when dialed from a pay or wire line phone. Wireless phone users are responsible for airtime and roaming charges according to their service contracts.

ODOT encourages motorists to pull off the road and park in a safe area before using cell phones.

Oregon's 511 service is part of a national travel information program. As of September 2004, 21 states now offer 511 service.

Pet Talk

If you are traveling and can't imagine spending the time without the furry members of your family, The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) offers tips for making the trip safe.

*Always be sure that your pet is safely restrained in your vehicle. If he is accustomed to one, your dog can be restrained with a pet safety harness that functions like a seatbelt. Or you can use a well-ventilated, hard-sided kennel. To ensure that they don't distract the driver, cats should always be kept in their carriers when traveling by car. All animals are safer in the back seat.

*Don't allow your canine companion to stick her head out the window when the vehicle is moving. Doing so can subject your pet to injury by flying debris. Never transport a dog in the open bed of a pickup truck.

*Always provide frequent bathroom and exercise breaks. When outside the car, make sure that your pet is always on a leash and wearing a collar and ID tag.

*Never leave your pet unattended in a parked car. Extreme temperatures are dangerous, and an animal left alone in a car is an open invitation to pet thieves.

HSUS recommends that you do not transport your pet by air unless absolutely necessary. According to the Airline Transportation Association, an estimated 5,000 animals die, or are injured or lost during airline travel each year.

Dear Dr. Doe

Dear Dr.:

I have a friend who's brilliant, but with women - clueless. He doesn't listen, talks nonstop, misreads signals, and offends people without meaning to.

Dear Mike:

You're a good friend to want to help Jimmy.

To find out what how attraction factors work, recent research analyzed real life "speed dating" - three-minute encounters (all you need to impress someone!). Men like a woman's looks first (reproductive biology says a man needs a young partner

with good genes, high fertility; ergo he'll go for attractive facial symmetry, youthful skin, and a waist-to-hip ratio of 0.7).

To be sure he's the father of her child, presumably, he'd want sexual fidelity. (But many men are drawn to women who aren't faithful, so go figure.) Women would want a provider and a solid commitment - right?

A Cornell University study quizzed 978 single people on what they want in a partner. They said they want someone like themselves, in status, looks, fidelity, and commitment. But when three researchers from London, Edinburgh and Berlin universities decided to do a real-life test, they discovered many factors - what counted was quite different.

In "speed dating," women liked a lot of short (less than a second) encouraging interjections like, "OK," "I see," or "Go on." Some men did only five. But the guys who did 30 in five minutes were rated by the women as the most attractive. So tell Jimmy about this study - he just might give it a shot.
