Nifty Tidbits By Chuck Rigby

Feb. 15, 1841 is an important date in the history of Oregon. It was the day that Ewing Young died.

We don't usually commemorate death dates, but there is no recorded birth date for Young, and his death had important consequences for Oregon. He was born in approximately 1810 in Knox County, Tennessee and received some early training as a cabinet maker. However, the lure of the West took him to New Mexico, and he became a fur trapper.

He was different than most trappers because he could read and write and carried with him a two-volume set of William Shakespeare, which he would read around the campfire at night. At his death, his belongings were auctioned, and the Shakespeare set sold for \$3.50. Near San Diego, Young came into contact with Hall Jackson Kelley, who convinced him to settle down in Oregon. On July 8, 1834 he left the San Francisco Bay area with Kelley and 100 head of horses and mules to make his way to Oregon. He was soon joined by

some Mexican bandits who had approximately 50 head of stolen cattle. Their troubles were many, including abandonment by the Mexicans, and difficulties with Indians in Southern Oregon.

Some writers claim that because Young referred to the Indians as rogues, the river in the area became known as the Rogue River from that time and the Indian tribe the Rogue Indians. Because of the stolen cattle, John McLoughlin, local head of the Hudson Bay Co., did not welcome him with open arms, but Young still started a farm on the Chchalem River in the north end of Willamette Valley.

In January 1837, Ewing Young was invited by local settlers, and even McLoughlin helped with the finances, to return to California and buy cattle to help establish the cattle business in Oregon. Transported to California by ship, Young and his crew had to do some fancy talking to convince Mexican authorities that this was a legal project. Eventually they purchased 1,000 head of half-wild cattle and proceeded to drive them north to Oregon.

River crossings, Indians, predators, wild cattle, and other problems culled the herd to 630 by the time they returned to Willamette Valley in October 1837. It was the first major cattle drive into Oregon and made possible the expansion of many farms and the population of early Oregon to have a stable economic base. Ewing Young also benefited from the drive, becoming one of the wealthiest men in the area.

Besides the farm, he built a gristmill, sawmill, and a store, which by 1841 amounted to a major part of the local economy. This is why his death from pneumonia was important to Oregon's history. It forced the settlers to gather and decide how the property would be disbursed, as he had no known heirs. Ira Babcock was appointed a judge and the previously mentioned auction was held. This raised \$3,734, out of which \$1,500 was used to erect the first public building in Oregon, a jail in Oregon City.

The settlers continued to meet to discuss local needs, called Wolf Meetings. And on May 2, 1843 at Champoeg, a Hudson Bay trading post, a historic vote was taken to decide whether Oregon would become British or American. The site of the meeting is now an Oregon state park. Later, a provisional government was organized and a petition sent the United States to request territorial status. This was granted in 1848, and on Feb. 14, 1859 Oregon was declared a state.

Of course many other people were involved in these steps, but Ewing Young should be considered one of Oregon's founding leaders.

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) is now offering The Neighborhood Cats TNR Kit for cat lovers and rescue groups alike who want to educate themselves on how to manage feral cat colonies by using the trap-neuter-return (TNR) method.

The kit is available for purchase by logging on to www.aspc.org/trkkit.

The New York City-based non-profit group, Neighborhood Cats, created the kit. The group, established in 1999, was formed to promote TNR as the most humane and effective means of solving NYC's severe feral cat overpopulation crisis.

The goal is to establish TNR as the preferred method of feral cat control to substantially reduce the number of cats born and living on NYC's streets.

The purchase price includes a handbook (A Guide to Trap-Neuter-Return for the Feral Cat Caretaker) and video (How to Perform a Mass Trapping). The handbook covers all aspects of practicing TNR and working with feral cats.

Chapters include, trapping and caring for cats in traps; arranging and utilizing spay/neuter services; providing food, water and shelter; building community relations; and socializing, relocating and adopting out feral cats.

The instructional video, using footage from actual Neighborhood Cats TNR projects, takes the viewer through the process of trapping and neutering an entire feral cat colony.

Specific topics include preparation for mass trapping; caring for cats before and after surgery; recognition of the different stages of anesthetic withdrawal; and releasing cats back into the colony.

A Look Back

On Feb. 28-29, 1704, Indians attacked Deerfield, Mass., killing 40 people and abducting 100 ... March 5, 1770, British troops fired into a Boston mob, killing five people, including Crispus Attucks, a Black man, reportedly the leader of the group; this was later called the Boston Massacre ... March 1, 1781, the Articles of Confederation took effect ... March 1, 1784, Thomas Jefferson's proposal to ban slavery in new territories after 1802 was narrowly defeated ... March 4, 1789, the First Congress met at Federal Hall in New York City, then the nation's capitol ... March 2, 1836, Texas declared its independence from Mexico ... March 6, 1836, the siege of the Alamo ended with the entire garrison killed ... Feb. 28, 1854, the Republican Party was formed in Ripon, Wis., in opposition to the Kansas-Nebraska Act, which left the issue of slavery up to a vote of the settlers ... March 6, 1857, the Supreme Court issued the Dred Scott decision, holding that slaves did not become free in a free state; Congress could not ban slavery from a territory; and Blacks could not be citizens ... March 3, 1891, the Forest Reserve Act was signed, allowing the president to close public forest land to settlement for the establishment of national parks ... March 1, 1932, 19-month-old Charles Lindbergh Jr., was kidnapped ... March 6, 1933, President Franklin Roosevelt ordered all U.S. banks closed ... March 5, 1946, in a speech at a Fulton, Mo., college, Winston Churchill employed the phrase, "Iron Curtain" ... March 1, 1954, five members of Congress were wounded in the House of Representatives by four Puerto Rican independence supporters who fired at random from a spectators' gallery ... Feb. 28, 1993, four federal agents were killed during an unsuccessful raid on the Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas ... March 6, 2003, the Senate approved, 95-0, the Strategic Offensive Reduction Treaty signed in 2002 by President Bush and President Vladimir Putin of Russia.
