The suspect was described as a white male adult, 6-3, 185 pounds, with dark brown hair and brown eyes.

Cadle told police that at approximately 4:56 a.m. on Thursday, June 1, a man with a flashlight approached

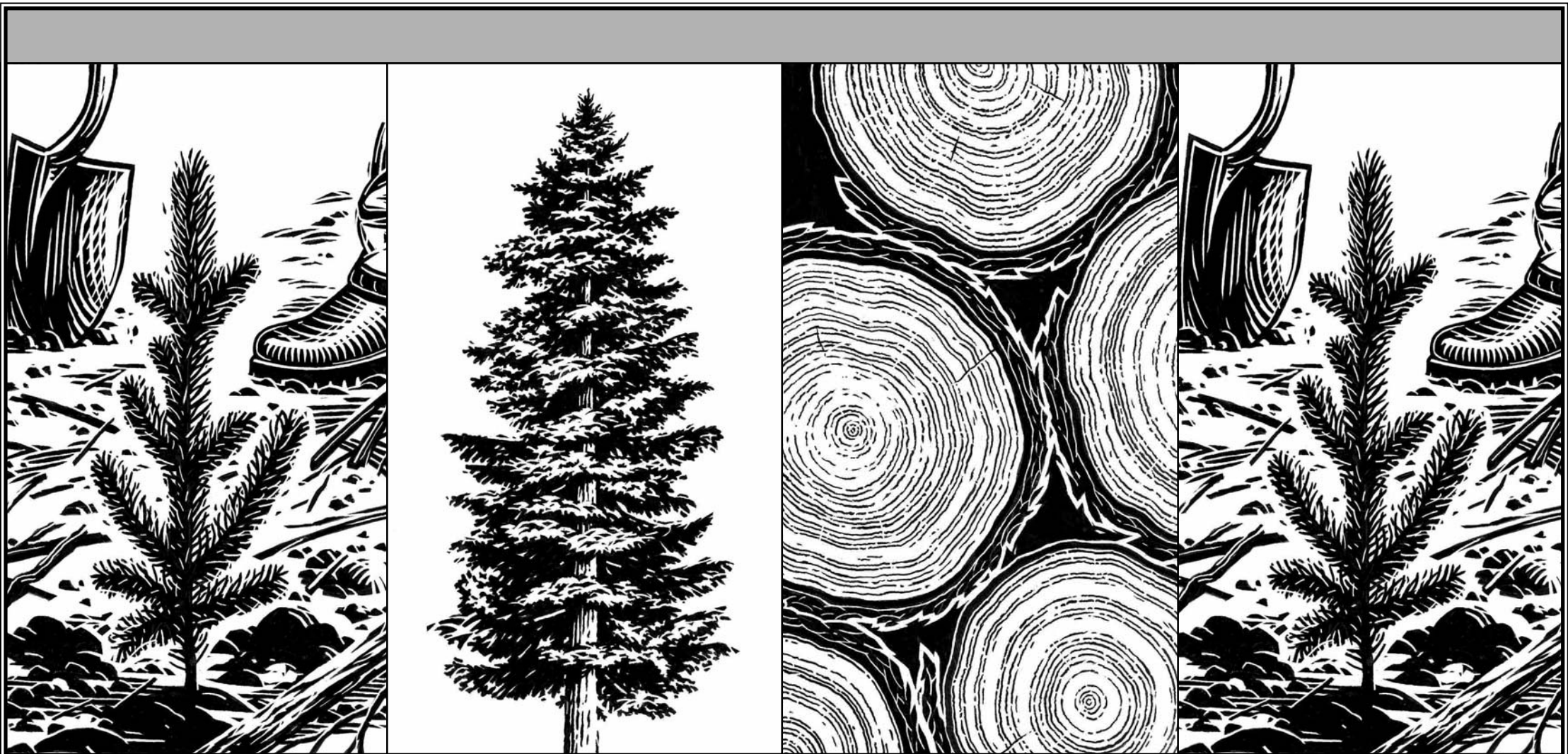
him, and threatened him with the device.
