Jesse Courtney

Former Illinois Valley resident and retired police officer Jesse Lee Courtney, 72, died Sept. 5, 2006 in Gardnerville, Nev.

A graveside service with honor guard presentation, provided by the Reno (Nev.) Police Dept., was conducted Monday, Sept. 11 at Doyle Cemetery in Doyle, Calif.

Mr. Courtney and his second wife, Robbie Lynn Courtney, operated Mr. B's Family Restaurant in Cave Junction for many years. The popular café

was across the street from River Valley Restaurant.

Mr. Courtney was born in Kentucky on Oct. 15, 1933. He served in the U.S. Navy during the Korean War, and he had a 34-year career in law enforcement. He began as a police officer in 1955 in Lynwood, Calif. In 1961 he became a deputy sheriff serving Mono County, based in Bridgeport, Calif.

He transferred to the Reno Police Dept. in 1969 and became a detective. After retiring from law enforcement, he and Robbie Courtney moved to Oregon to semiretire and open a restaurant. After his beloved Robbie died, he returned to California to be near family, but had been living most recently in Gardnerville.

Mr. Courtney was known as a friend to everyone. He had a passion for fishing throughout his lifetime. He enjoyed helping his first wife, with whom he always remained close, at a restaurant in Bridgeport; greeting friends and other customers.

He was known as a loving father and grandfather who never forgot a birthday or other special occasion.

Mr. Courtney is survived by a son, Gordon Courtney, of Bridgeport; a daughter, Debbie Courtney-Parisi, of Fort Collins, Colo.; his ex-wife and good friend, Jean Courtney, of Bridgeport; and three grandchildren. He also leaves behind numerous friends.

Scarlet Letter due by OLCC for violators

Beginning Oct. 1, restaurants, markets and bars with suspended liquor licenses will be required to let the public know about it, under a rule adopted by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC).

The rule (OAR 845-006-0498) requires that signs be posted at premise entrances notifying customers, alcohol distributors, law officers and others that the business is not selling alcohol, and the date that sales will resume.

Katie Hilton, OLCC rules coordinator, said that licenses can be suspended for liquor law violations. She added and that a number of people need to know the status of that license.

"Distributors will know if and when it is legal to deliver alcohol; OLCC staff and police will immediately know the status of a license and be able to check for compliance.

"And the public will know if alcohol is available for sale at the location," she explained.

During a license suspension, retailers may operate their business provided there is no sale, delivery, service, consumption, removal or receipt of alcoholic beverages. Also, alcohol may not be served during banquets or other temporary events, and signs prohibiting minors will remain in effect during the suspension.
