

Summer fun needs attention to shocking details

Planning skydiving, flying airplanes or helicopters, parasailing, hang gliding, riding in hot-air balloons, playing with model airplanes or kites, sailing or angling this summer?

Keep safety in mind while out having fun, said Pacific Power. It offers the following tips for avoiding danger with recreational equipment and activities:

*Before embarking on any flight-type adventures, check first for overhead power lines and keep well away from them.

*Pilots who fly at low altitudes must be alert to power lines spanning waterways, canyons and other locations so they do not accidentally make contact. Generally, any time pilots find themselves below mountain ridge tops they are in a wire environment.

*Be aware that as light sources change so can visibility of overhead power lines. Where a wire can be visible in cloudy conditions, the sun may make lines virtually in-

visible.

*Fly kites, balloons and model airplanes in open areas away from power lines.

*If a kite or other toy or piece of recreational equipment becomes tangled in electrical wires, immediately let go of it and make no attempt to remove it from the lines. Phone Pacific Power at (888) 221-7070.

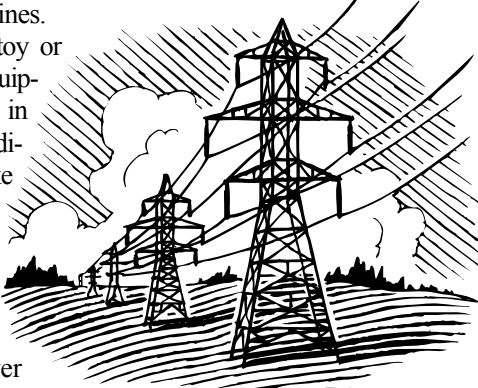
*When boating, watch for overhead power lines, as masts, fishing poles, leaded fishing line or tall radio antenna could contact overhead wires and cause shock or electrocution.

*When parasailing, hang gliding or flying hot-air balloons, stay clear of any overhead power lines and poles. Contact with high-voltage lines can cause serious injuries or death.

*It's easy to misjudge the distance you are from power lines. Your best line of defense for maintaining safety is to stay as far away as possible from any lines or electrical

equipment.

*Try to contain activities to times of the day



when the sun is not rising or setting. These times of day can cause increased glare and can be very hazardous as lines and equipment become more difficult to identify.

"People need to stay aware of power lines and electrical equipment during everyday outdoor activities in order to stay safe," said Pacific Power.

"Electrical accidents don't occur only in the course of aerial or waterborne recreational activities; they can happen in or around your

own home or neighborhood if you aren't careful," the utility continued. "Children may not be aware of the dangers posed by electrical equipment, so it's important for parents to ensure that their children are instructed to avoid activities and places where they could be at risk."

Pacific offers the following outdoor safety tips:

*Check trees for overhead wires running near or through limbs and branches before climbing or building tree houses. If lines are present, do not climb the tree for any reason.

*Never climb a substation fence. Fences protect people from serious hazards. If a ball or other personal property lands inside a substation fence, phone Pacific Power at (888) 221-7070.

*Never pole, pry or climb on tan or green-boxed ground-mounted transformers. They're safe as sealed, but pose a threat if tampered with.

*Ensure that trampolines are never placed under power lines.

*Fly kites away from overhead power lines. If a kite becomes tangled in electrical wires, immediately let go of the string and make no attempt to remove the kite. Phone Pacific Power at (888) 221-7070.
