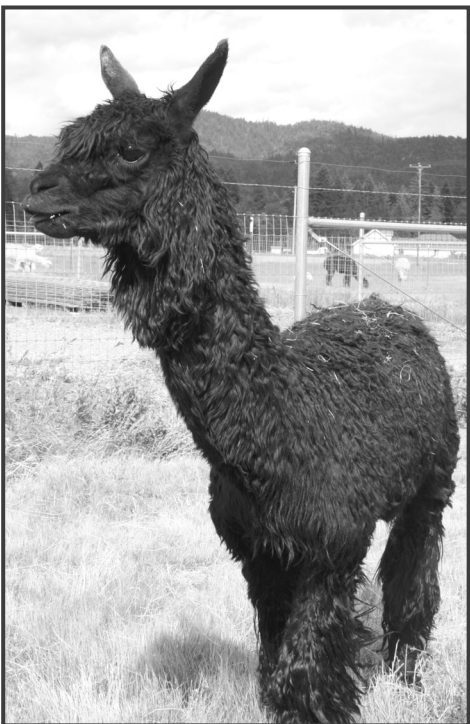


Arts & Entertainment

KS Wild, Siskiyou Project

Beginning Saturday, May 31, KS Wild and Siskiyou Project will lead hikes on last Saturdays into proposed Wilderness areas along the Lower

Rogue River.

Hikers will see diverse wild forests, wildlife viewing opportunities, wildflowers and clear creeks. Trip leaders will discuss Wilderness, and Wild & Scenic proposals for the area, as well as Bureau of Land Management logging plans.

Car-pools will leave the Gooseberries Natural Foods parking lot (1533 N.E. F St.) in Grants Pass at 10 a.m. and meet at the Graves Creek Boat Ramp at 11. Participants should bring hiking shoes, clothing layers, food and water. Hikes are moderate and approximately 5 to 7 miles long.

Selma Community & Education Center (SCEC)

A free Oregon Chautauqua program, *True Stories and Other Fictions in Northwest Oral History*, will be hosted Saturday, June 7 at 1:30 p.m. at SCEC (the former Selma Elementary School) at 18255 Redwood Hwy. in Selma a short distance north of Ray's Food Place.

Professor Tom Nash from Southern Oregon University at Ashland will look at elements of folklore embedded in supposedly nonfiction stories of frontier Oregon and the West. His material is drawn from Oregon oral histories recorded primarily in the 1930s and '40s, and are now held at the state library in Salem.

Nash found that styles of interviewing affected the content of the collected stories. That brought him to wonder about the role of fiction in history.

Oregon Chautauqua programs are offered to communities throughout the state by Oregon Council for the Humanities, an independent, non-profit affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities dedicated to the belief that knowledge and ideas are fundamental to the health of communities.

Illinois Valley Section, Sierra Club

Do Oregon and Nebraska share a common border? That was shown on a map that Robert L. Hamm found in a small Greenwich Village shop in 1987.

His discovery sparked his passion for maps and led to the development of his Oregon Chautauqua program, *Mapping the West: Eighteenth- and Nineteenth-Century Cartography*. This free program will be hosted Monday, June 9, at 7 p.m., at the Community Media & Education Center, 140-C S. Redwood Hwy. in Downtown Cave Junction.

Hamm will discuss how political, social, and cultural events of the times influenced mapmaking art and science; that the area we call Oregon has been labeled New Albion, Quivera, and Rupertsland; how the River of the West, although nonexistent, appeared on maps for decades.
