

Tales from the Police Blotter

Saturday, Sept. 20
*Two vehicles were reported stolen from a Caves Hwy. residence in the 800 block.
*Screaming was reported coming from the vicinity of Jubilee Park at 12:26 a.m.
*Seven juvenile persons, ages 13- to 16-years-old, were warned regarding curfew and trespassing at Lorna Byrne Middle School at 12:31 a.m.

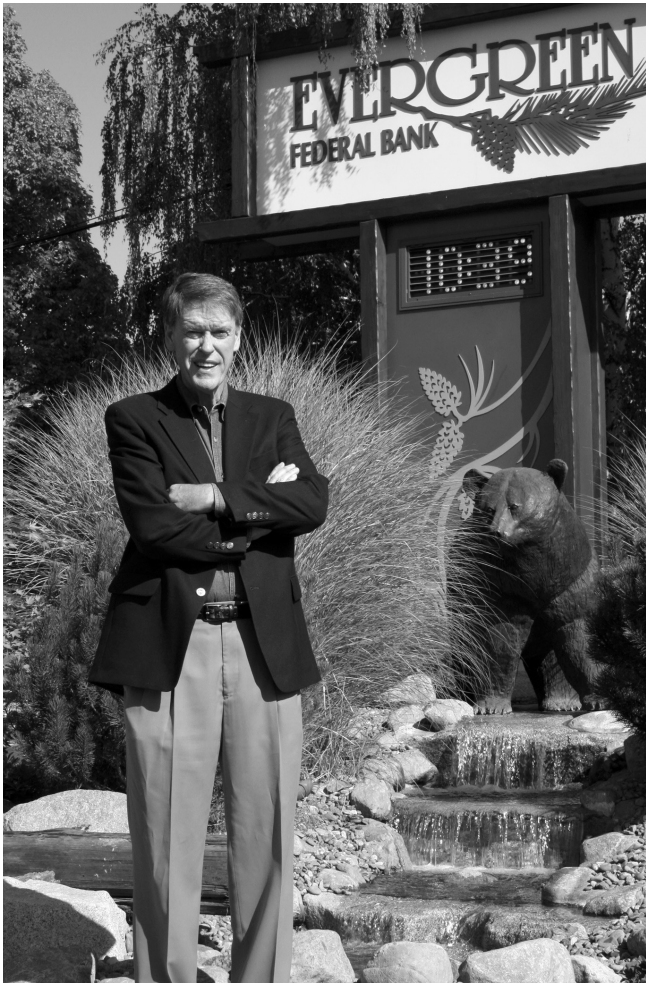
blood alcohol content was listed as .09, and his vehicle was impounded.
