Boaters urged to avoid Savage Rapids area

The Savage Rapids Dam on the Rogue River near Grants Pass was breached on Oct. 9, allowing safe passage for fish, but not necessarily safe passage for boaters.

"The current is running really fast, and the banks are extremely unstable," said Josephine County Sheriff Gil Gilbertson.

"There's all kinds of debris, including rebar that can easily snag and flip a boat," he warned. "Because of the varying depth and extreme speed of the current, it's best that boaters avoid the area entirely -- just stay out of it."

"It's dangerous for boaters and for people along the banks," the sheriff said.

On Oct. 10, a jet boat operator crashed after making a run through the remains of

the dam. Fortunately, three passengers survived, suffering only minor injuries. The boat operator was not as fortunate.

"The river is shifting things around every day," Gilbertson added. A pinned drift boat is among the dam debris. The boater was able to make it out safely.

The contractor has signage upriver stating, "DANGER Unknown River Conditions Ahead. EXIT RIVER," but the sheriff's office will add additional signs warning boaters of the inherent danger.

JHCDC administers the federally funded, Section 8 Tenant-Based Assistance programs for the county. Its purpose is to provide low-income residents with opportunities to obtain affordable housing and achieve self-sufficiency.

In general, board members set the direction and tone

of JHCDC. Members give direction to the executive director, as necessary, and review situations brought to their attention.

The board is responsible for the decisions they make in their capacity as board members. The board reviews, sets and amends policies for general operation, reviews new programs and decides whether or not to apply for them, and also reviews regular program reports submitted by staff at monthly meetings.

Applications will be accepted until the position is filled, and can be picked up at the Josephine County Board of Commissioners office at the courthouse in Grants Pass.

"To sell it, then throw it all away doesn't make any sense to me."

The global recession and a slumping housing market certainly have contributed to the timber industry's woes throughout the past couple of years, as demand for timber products has dropped. However, Phillippi remains concerned that the long-term viability of the last few re-

maining mills could be threatened by federal policies that emphasize thinning projects at the expense of other harvesting alternatives.

"Thinning is fine," he said. "It goes so far, but you can't thin forests forever."

"I'm disappointed by the WOPR decision, but certainly, Salazar's interim proposal is a short-term fix for the larger, longer-term problem of BLM timber harvest."
