

Backyard bird watching with Harry

Do you know birds? Here are bird facts on some local birds that we frequently see in the Illinois Valley. By the way, it is winter and the cold wet weather is here. It's important that you keep the food supply for your birds full and fresh. You may want to think about adding some nuts to your seed mix. The protein in the nuts will help the birds during these cold months. Be sure to use raw nuts – no salt, not roasted.

Black Capped Chickadee:

- Maine and Massachusetts claim the chickadee as their official state bird.
- Chickadees typically mate for life, but occasionally a chickadee will get a "divorce" in order to pair up with a higher ranking bird.

Dark eyed Junco:

- The dark eyed junco is the No.1 feeder bird in the United States.
- Juncos are actually a type of sparrow.

The American Goldfinch:

- The goldfinch is the official state bird of New Jersey, Washington State and Iowa.
- Unlike many birds, goldfinches molt twice a year, in spring and fall (most birds molt in fall only).

- Goldfinches are one of the few song birds that are almost completely vegetarian.
- They can satisfy their need for water by eating snow.

Purple Finch:

- The purple finch is the official state bird of New Hampshire.
- The male purple finch may lift the feathers atop its head slightly, creating the appearance of a crest.
- The purple finch isn't really purple; it is red.

Evening Grosbeak:

- Evening grosbeaks are members of the finch family.
- A single grosbeak is capable of eating almost 100 sunflower seeds in 5 minutes.

Nuthatches:

- Nuthatches feed exclusively on insects in summer, but in winter switch to a seed based diet.
- Curved claws and strong hind toes help nuthatches cling to tree trunks. They go headfirst down a tree trunk, which helps them spot hidden insects that other birds missed.

Tree Swallows:

- Because of their taste for mosquitoes, tree swallows often make

their homes near water.

- Cold, wet summers are rough on hatchling tree swallows. In a lean year, only about 20 percent make it to adulthood.

Northern Flicker:

- The northern flicker is the state bird of Alabama, where it's known as the yellowhammer.
- A flicker's diet is about 60 percent animal and 40 percent vegetable. Most of the animal portion is ants and the vegetable portion is berries.

Blue Jay:

- When surprised or agitated it points its crest forward and when excited it holds its crest erect, when resting or quietly feeding it flattens its crest.
- Birds rarely use tools, but jays were observed using paper strips to corral pellets of food.
- Jays sometimes groom themselves by combing through their feathers with live ants, which may help kill lice and other parasites.

“Mad Doctors” tour coming to Selma

A group of physicians advocating a single-risk pool national health insurance program took a national tour in 2009 and 2010.

This year, Oregon Physicians for a National Health Program (PNHP) and Mad as Hell Doctors (MAHD) are following up with rallies in Medford, Grants Pass and Selma.

According to an MAHD news release, the tour will come to the Selma Community Center from 12 to 2 p.m. Monday, March 28, and the Anne Basker Auditorium in Grants Pass at 6 p.m. March 26.

The tour includes documentary videos, testimony from doctors and nurses, music by bluegrass singer/composer Bob Wickline and ‘Mad as Heck Minutes’ with audience members.

Doctors in the two groups are proposing their improvements to the Patient Protection and Affordable Health Care Act passed in 2009 that they believe is a start, but does not go far enough to protect patients and families.

In late 2009, the tour reportedly stopped in more than 40 venues in 22 states and appeared on MSNBC’s Ed Schultz show, Keith Olbermann and other media outlets.
