

Tales from the Police Blotter

Friday, Feb. 15

*An Animal Control employee and a Search and Rescue volunteer were in the 4600 block of Takilma Road to seize two horses whose owner abandoned them, according to a neighbor. The equine owner was on the property, but locked himself inside an RV. There was no probable cause for action.

*Headed toward Illinois Valley from Wonder, the driver of a “crotch rocket” was pursued by a deputy, but got away by driving through barriers at the end of a road.

*From rural Grants Pass

*A woman on W. Jones Creek Road said that her felonious father, who has threatened to kill her, took seven guns including two machine guns, from her property. The responding deputy noted that the incident “was unfounded as a restraining order violation.”
*After finding some \$2,700

worth of damage to their two vehicles, a Wolf Creek couple stated that their “friends” denied striking the vehicles with theirs.

*Mark Cobb, 54, was arrested on Garnet Lane after complaints by his mother. He was charged with unlawful use of a weapon, and two counts each of fourth-degree domestic assault and menacing.

Thursday, Feb. 21

*Some punk tried to steal a pickup truck from Addison Lane, but only damaged the ignition and other parts leaving it undrivable.

*Counseling was provided to a woman on Stevenson Street regarding her daughter, who “is continually truant... uncared for by her mom and allowed to run free.” The daughter needs up-to-date immunizations to continue attending school and stop being truant, it was noted.

*A restraining order was served on Hogue Drive.

A woman in a wheelchair, although handcuffed, kept “standing up and punching people.” A civilian who handcuffed her said that he didn’t have a key. Eventually all was calm and the woman in the wheelchair might face a charge of harassment toward an employee.

Pianist and composer to hold listening and improvising workshop

Cave Junction-- The Frog Farm will be hosting a one-day workshop on listening and improvisation, lead by master composer/pianist/teacher Thollem McDonas. His workshop, given throughout the States and in Europe, is a laboratory that explores group collaboration, large ensemble improvisation (structured, conducted and free), egalitarian group dynamics, consensus decision-making, and communication skills. Discussions can include the implications of improvisation, collaboration and active listening from everyday life to global political dynamics.

Thollem invites all to participate: anyone with these genuine interests, regardless of age, language skills, and/or perceived artistic abilities.

The workshop will utilize everyday sound sources: objects that already naturally exist in the space, voices, traditional musical instruments, and ambient sounds that are occurring outside of the group. The emphasis is not necessarily on individual creativity or high levels of musicianship, but on the ability to listen and make spontaneous music with others. Thollem has invented structured improvisations that are designed specifically to be used by anyone regardless of their musical experience, age, or language. Most importantly, the workshop will develop organically from the input of the participants, a natural progression, a structured improvisation of its own.

Thollem is a perpetually traveling musician, sharing his time between North America and Europe, performing/ recording as a soloist, in collaboration with many other individuals and groups, as well as leading large ensemble improvisation/collaboration workshops. His music is diverse, approaching each concert and project uniquely, resulting in dramatically new and different outcomes.
