What if you only had a few days to live? What would you be telling others? What would you be passionate about? What would be so important for you to share before you were gone?

This coming Sunday is Resurrection Sunday. The day our Lord and Savior was raised from the dead and was witnessed by His disciples and five hundred other brothers. (I Cor. 15:6) The Resurrection account is seen in the Gospel of John chapter 20 and just a few chapters earlier we have the famous “Last Supper” starting in John chapter 13 where Jesus has an opportunity to celebrate the Passover meal with his disciples. All the while Jesus, knowing his time is short and this life will soon be abruptly ended, what does He find important to tell these guys before He is gone? Amazingly Jesus does not discuss theology or doctrine. He does not lay out how the Sunday morning service is to look like or how church government is to function or even a long list of do’s and don’ts. But what He does speak is the very heartbeat of God. In chapter 13 he begins by giving an example of His type of leadership.

Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going back to God, rose from supper. He laid aside his outer garments, and taking a towel, tied it around his waist. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples’ feet and to wipe them with the towel

“Then they brought it (the colt) to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying, ‘Blessed is the king; who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!’ Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, ‘Teacher, order your disciples to stop.’ He answered, ‘I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out.’”

And the people spread palms along the way for the colt to walk on.....hence the name given to this past Sunday, “Palm

Anastasis

Matthew 28:6 “He is not here; for He is risen, as He said.”

Anastasis is a Greek word meaning a raising up, rising, resurrection.

March 31st is the Sunday that we remember and celebrate Jesus’ resurrection from the dead. Jesus could have been born, been an incomparable teacher, a great leader of men, a profoundly wise philosopher, a healer of every malady, a sacrificial server, a conqueror of men’s hearts and nations, and a king unequalled, and yet, He would only be a footnote in history without His resurrection from the dead. The Christian faith in its true essence is not religious

institutions, lists of do’s and don’ts, acts of religious piety, or even religious teaching. The hope and foundation of our faith is that Jesus came to forgive our sins, something no one else could do (Mark 2:5-10), so that we might obtain eternal life. The proof of Jesus’ claim is that death and the grave could not hold Him; He rose from the dead and the world was changed. Read I Corinthians 15:1-11 where the apostle Paul explains Jesus’ resurrection from a first-hand point of view. The book of Romans lays out the need and means of salvation. Romans 3:23 says, “For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.” No one will make it to heaven on their own merit. There is a penalty for sin: Romans 6:23a says, “For the wages of

that was wrapped around him (John 13:3-5). When he had washed their feet and put on his outer garments and resumed his place, he said to them, “Do you understand what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another’s feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you. Truly, truly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them (John 13:12-17). A little later we read “A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you

also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another” (John 13:34-35).

In our culture today we do not see the washing of feet but in this we see the example of serving others. So what is Jesus passionate about? What does He tell those dearest to him before he is crucified? Serve one another and love one another. Lord help us to master these simple truths.

Come join us Sunday morning as we celebrate the risen King!

Backyard bird watching with Harry: by Harry Johnson

The April Bird of the Month: The Rufous Hummingbird

Springtime is here and it’s the season for the return of the hummingbird. One of my favorite hummers is the Rufous. They are fun to watch darting from tree to feeder and fighting off other hummers who want food from that feeder. They are very territorial

when it comes to their food. Rufous hummingbirds are small, only 3-4 inches tall. They breed here in the Northwest during the spring and summer. The adult male has a Rufous (orange) head, back and tail. The top of its head is green. The females aren’t easily identified. You have to look very closely to be able to see the Rufous color on the tops of their tail feathers and above their eyes.

What do Rufous Hummingbirds eat? They love nectar from your flowers. When the flowers aren’t available to

them, they will love sap from woodpecker holes. Of course, one must have its daily share of protein, so they look for their favorite meal, the ant. You may not think of them as ant eaters, but they love them. The other source for food is the feeder with rich, sweet nectar, hanging outside your windows. Remember to use a 4-1 water to sugar ratio.

Because they breed here in the Northwest, they are more likely to be found nesting in conifers than other hummingbirds would be. But, like other hummingbirds, they

also nest in our hardwood forests. You can look for them, but remember they’re very small. I’ve looked and looked and I’ve only seen one and that one I passed right by not realizing it was a nest. They are so small.

Did you know?

1. The Rufous hummingbird is very aggressive and territorial.
2. It can withstand temperatures as low as zero degrees.
3. Rufous hummingbirds breed in the summer and spring

as far north as the Yukon and winter in Mexico. That makes their migration the longest of any bird when measured by body length!

4. Rufous hummingbirds can scoot sideways when perched, but they can’t walk.

Please remember to clean out your feeders often. The sugar water you use can go bad with the summer heat.

I would love to meet you and talk about your hummingbirds and the other birds in your backyard. I have my Saturday morning breakfast at My Place Family Café in Cave Junction. I’m there from 8:30 to 10a.m. Come by and say “Hi”.
