Winding Trails:

Trilliums

The trilliums, or wake-robins, are among the best known flowers and most beloved of our western wildflowers. We are fortunate in having in our area three species of these fragrant and beautiful members of the lily family. No other comparable area in the land can boast of three distinct species of trillium with at least one species being indigenous to the locality, and all three sometimes growing within a stone's throw of each other – as they are in Packer's Gulch.

Trillium rivale, the wee brook trillium, is native only to the Siskiyou and is found in abundance here in Illinois Valley. Only a few inches high, it is distinguished in form from our other two species in having its whorl of three leaves each borne on a leaf-stem, or petiole. The single showy flower is raised above the leaves on a stem of its own. The three petals are white, or sometimes tinged with lavender and somewhat speckled. In all the trilliums the sepals, leaves, and stigmas, as well as the petals are in sets of three, hence the name, trillium, which is from a Latin root meaning three.

Trillium ovatum, the western or coast trillium, is a much larger species, sometimes a foot or more tall, that loves the damp, shady woods. Its flower is usually white, becoming rose-red with age. This species differs from the little brook trillium in form in that the whorl of leaves are sessile, or stemless, the flower rising on a stem above them as in the brook trillium.

Trillium sessile (also called T. Chloropetalum because of its diversity of flower colors), the giant or common trillium, is much the largest, showiest and commonest of our wake-robins. It is unlike both the preceding species in form in having the leaves and flowers stemless, the large flower sitting down snugly among the three-whorled leaves. The petals of giant trillium are long and narrow and the leaves are often handsomely mottled with purplish or brownish blotches. In our locality the flowers of this species are yellowish or greenish white; near the coast, among the redwoods, they are dark maroon.

In order to help straighten out the confusion that exists in many peoples' minds regarding the names trillium and wake-robin as applied to these popular species of wildflowers, the following information was taken from my private library of western wildplants.

Leslie L. Haskins, in WILD-FLOWERS OF THE PACIFIC COAST: "The trillium is also called wakerobin because its flowers as harbingers of spring are supposed to wake the robin to renewed activity and song."

Edith S. Clements, in FLOWERS OF COAST AND SIERRA: "– the trilliums are among the earliest messengers of spring. They are sometimes so early, indeed, as to precede that early bird of spring, the robin, and to be called wake-robin in consequence."

The well known botanist-authors, Helen M. Gilkey and Gabrielson, in their respective books on western wildplants, place the names trillium and wake-robin side by side as identical terms for the same plants.

Jepson, Peck, Munz, and Abrams, authors of the four complete manuals of the wildplant life of the Pacific states, all make clear that the names trillium and wake-robin are merely synonyms. And they are backed up by WEBSTER'S NEW INTERNATIONAL DICTIONARY. So you may safely take your choice.

But by whatever name you call them, nothing can alter the fact that these exquisite wild beauties, the trilliums, or wake-robins, are near the very top of the list in who's who of the west's wildflowers.
