CERT training set for new volunteers

The I.V. Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) will offer a six-day introductory training series during the last two weekends in October and the first weekend in November.

Friday classes take place from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. and Saturday classes will run from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

CERT coordinator Sue Williams stated, "CERT is an integral part of the Illinois Valley emergency response to community wide emergencies and disasters."

Under the umbrella of the I.V. Fire District (IVFD), these volunteers train to help their families, neighborhoods and communities prepare for disasters such as wildfires, flooding and earthquakes.

CERT training is designed to relieve first responders from basic tasks during an emergency so that they can concentrate on more important duties.

Training involves both classroom work and structured field exercises

where volunteers learn to work as a team.

Exercises include learning how to extract a victim from a debris pile, how to use a fire extinguisher on a burn pile, basic search and rescue techniques, medical triage in a multiple casualty disaster, and radio communication.

During the two Selma wildfire incidents this summer, CERT personnel assisted with traffic control and notified homeowners in the path of the fire that they needed to evacuate.

They accomplished similar roles during the August 2015 Krauss Lane Fire which threatened homes in the Ken Rose subdivision.

During that event, CERT volunteers assisted with traffic control, evacuated several horses, staffed a public information booth at Shop Smart, and worked with the Red Cross in setting up their shelter for those evacuating their homes.

Last year's Rockydale and West Side Road fires had CERT volunteers involved. CERT volunteers have also assisted with search and

rescue and other emergencies in recent years.

Additionally, this group has been involved in neighborhood door-to-door efforts to distribute information on how to prepare for an emergency, how to assemble a "go bag" in advance of an emergency evacuation, and educating residents on the new automatic telephone alert system.

Most recently, the group participated in an emergency preparedness information fair at the Rogue Valley Mall in Medford.

Currently, there are 20 volunteers comprising the IVFD/CERT group, representing areas from Selma, Cave Junction, Holland Loop and O'Brien.

Williams said, "More volunteers are needed so that our valley is better prepared in an emergency to help ourselves and the first responders. Becoming part of CERT is not only demanding and educational, but fun!"

The group recently applied for an Oregon Homeland Security Grant and received \$10,000 which

will pay for a 6 foot by 12 foot enclosed cargo trailer, educational materials and other items as well as fund wilderness first aid training for five attendees in Medford.

The group is seeking a volunteer grant writer to find funding for additional equipment, including full-rimmed helmets and improved headlamps.

Applications for the introductory training are available Monday through Thursday at the IVFD Station No. 1 at 681 Caves Highway. Requirements in advance of the training include completing three free online courses addressing the Incident Command Structure and undergoing a background check.

It takes between two and six weeks to complete a background check, so applicant names accepted now will go on a waiting list for the next training.

Amy Wels, Josephine County Drug Court coordinator said that of 35 participants, heroin is the primary or secondary drug addiction for 27, and that 15 of the 16 pending clients are heroin users.

Dwight Holton, CEO of Portland based Lines for Life facilitated the discussion and summed up four ways to attack the problem including better education, fewer pills

prescriptions, better access to addiction treatment, and better pill disposal programs.

During a telephone interview, USDA Rural Development Community Development Specialist Jill Rees, stated the roundtable event was created as a listening session, to hear firsthand from the dozen specialists and others and gather ideas for funding programs that will best reverse the problem.

"More than anything we want to know what's working and what is not," Rees said. "We want to help tailor solutions toward economies of scale happening in rural areas and make connections locally and regionally."
