The mayor then opened the meeting up for public comment, but asked that it be limited to residents of the city. Of the six citizens who addressed the council, five were in support of withdrawing from the lawsuit. “I think it is time to get out of the lawsuit and get on with the business of taking care of the citizens of this town. We have more important things to deal with,” one woman said. Another attendee pointed out that 66 percent of the voters within Cave Junction city limits voted to legalize marijuana, which shows that the majority of city voters support legal marijuana.

Dalegowski then made a motion to withdraw from the ongoing litigation. He, Gardiner and Bosch voted to withdraw; Miller and Jacobson voted to stay the course. Miller stated that, although she was one of the original council members who voted to pursue the litigation, “Since the decision has been made by the majority of the council, I will stand by that so we can move forward in any positive way we can.” The council now has to decide what course the city will take in regulating cannabis businesses.
