Happy Camp News Jan. 5, 2018

and it is so beautiful. My husband, Dan, got a package of light bulbs, so he got something to unwrap too. It was fun and we enjoyed the received gifts.

It was such a relief that Happy Camp didn't start the year like last year. Remember the beginning of January 2017? The snow began to fall and seemed to fall forever. At our home we were without electricity for three weeks, although some places were only off the grid temporarily for shorter times. So much snow fell that it wasn't possible to get my car out of the driveway for over three weeks either. All of a sudden one night early on, a light appeared, and it was our youngest, Stephen, with a camp lantern. The lantern provided light when flashlight batteries were getting low and the candles weren't safe. It was an ingenious invention that charges my cell phone as well.

Opening email from Christmas to New Year's Eve means getting two-thirds of them asking for an end of the year donation. All good causes, but one can't give to all; feed all the starving children, preserving life of all the babes to be murdered, homeless, humanitarian, environmental, educational and every political cause. I wish that there were enough discretionary

funds to send a big check to them all, but that is not the case.

I inquired at the Happy Camp Branch Library of Dorothy LaHue, if they took donations of read books for the library as they used to do. They used to have hundreds of books for sale at least once a year in Happy Camp. Dorothy said that they don't have any place to keep them, and so they don't accept them now. I wish that the library had a big new library building to house all their books and children's books and periodicals, the computers people come in and use, and the other media that they have available. It is really a resource that is vastly underused. A spare room to make used books available to purchase could pay for some of the items they need fundraising for as well. The library on Buckhorn Road next to the cemetery is open Tuesday afternoons.

An old email letter that Jim Waddell once wrote to HappyCampNews.com reminded me why it is so great to live among our neighbors along the Klamath River. The community is great about working out things that need doing. If there is a need, often members of the community get together and work on solving the problems.

When Rev. Dr. Leon Loofbourow, a Methodist Circuit

Riding Preacher came through as soon as there was a road to Happy Camp, land and logs were donated, a barn came down, and the log church was built. That log church now is the home of the Happy Camp Bible Church.

When the community needed a high school, it being during the Depression, there weren't many resources that could help. So the land was donated, Newton's donated trees to be cut and before you know it, the log high school was built.

The community built the building that the Lions used for years, and the Scouts too. The Happy Camp Community Center served the whole community as our medical clinic for many years and then as the Family Resource Center. The Family Resource Center has made use of a wide variety of buildings; Litteral Parts, Indian Creek Café, Headway Market. For awhile it seemed like every place they moved into was sold and they had to move again.

The Grange was built and they kept up the Cemetery, and then Veterans of Foreign War, American Legion and Scouts joined in that effort. Later the Grange spearheaded the building of the Fire Hall.

Recently, a window at the Frontier Café was broken. Other places have had burglaries. There

is always concern for our friends and neighbors with addictions as well as the crimes that those difficulties bring. So we need all those with solutions for the alcohol and drug problems and crime to go to the Happy Camp Neighborhood Watch Meeting at 5:30 p.m. the first Monday of each month at the Karuk Housing Conference Room. Give David Culbert or Lisa Bousfield a call and be put on the list to be notified when help is needed. Besides those who patrol, direct traffic, check on homes, it is a big help when people contribute to a bake sale or other fundraisers to provide the funds for the cameras, signs and other supplies that are needed.

This year has gotten off to a good start. As we look forward to the projects to be tackled in the new year and the activities coming up, we are so happy to live along the wild and beautiful Klamath River. What can you do to help make our community strong? Pick out the need on your heart and join others working to see it accomplished. This year is a good time to turn around and walk into a new 2018. Let's work together to make our community great!

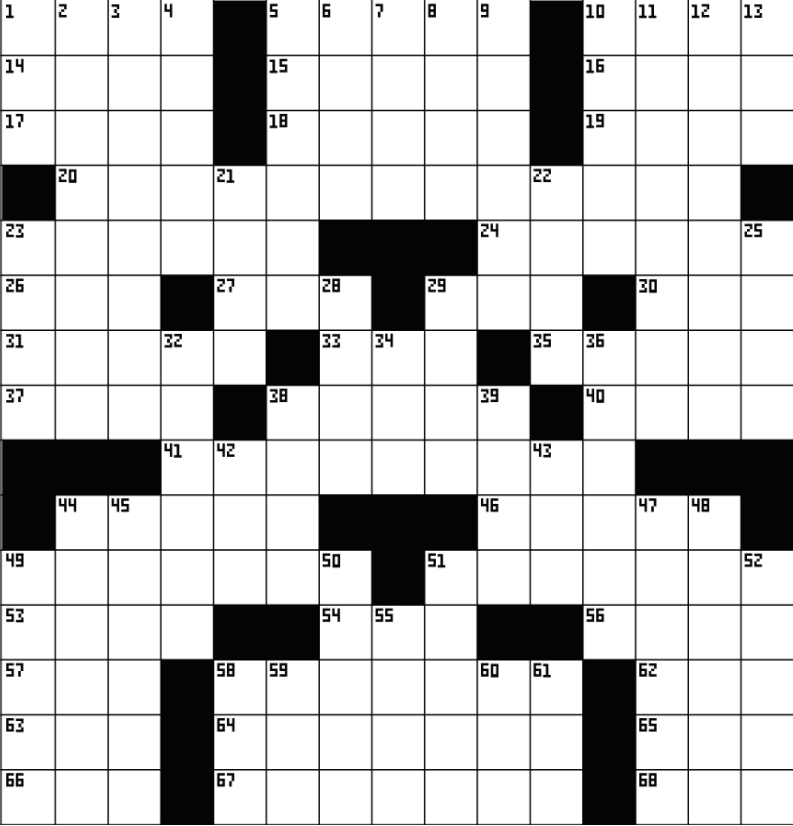
