There’s a fair amount of recreation out there and very limited road access. Our petition focused on fish, recreation, drinking water downstream and the botanical reserves.”

So what constitutes an Outstanding Resource Water? According to Oregon Administrative Rule OAR 340-041-0002(45): “Outstanding Resource Water means those waters designated by the Environmental Quality Commission where existing high quality waters constitute an outstanding state or national resource, based on their extraordinary water quality or ecological values, or where special water quality protection is needed to maintain critical habitat areas.” These waters are the best of the best.

The designation also includes the 555 acre Cedar Creek parcel of state land. This particularly inaccessible and untrammelled area represents the only non-National Forest land in Oregon’s half of the North Fork Smith watershed. It’s surrounded on three sides by the Packsaddle Roadless Area and on one side by the Smith River National Recreation Area.

In a Dec. 22, 2017, Guest Opinion published in the Medford Tribune, Tim Palmer wrote, “Few streams in America compare for clarity... Oregon has acted to protect one of our finest rivers.”

The Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument Artist-in-Residence Program is founded on the belief that artists look closely at the way the world works, notice things that others may have missed, challenge ideas and create in a variety of forms, and therefore can provide new ways to look at and appreciate public lands managed by the BLM.

The program provides artistic and educational opportunities that promote deeper understanding and

dialogue about the natural, cultural and historic resources on public lands. It also offers writers, composers and visual and performing artists the opportunity to pursue their artistic discipline amid inspiring landscapes.

Artistic expertise, professionalism and creative uses of artistic media are encouraged. Selected artists receive a one to two week residency at Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument facilities during the summer. During their stay, artists will share their work in a public presentation.

Participating artists are also asked to donate to the BLM

the use of an original piece of artwork from their residency in the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument. Monument staff are especially interested in artwork relevant to the BLM mission that can be used in exhibits and for educational purposes. In addition, artwork may be used by non-profit partners for items such as postcards, posters and similar items. The artist will retain both the original artwork and the copyright.

“The more you have local inputs available for the production of marijuana, that would imply a higher multiplier,” said Anderson.

Trimmigants coming from

outside the region are another factor in our local multiplier, depending on how much of their wages they spend in local businesses as opposed to their home regions. But, said Anderson, if the amount of grower income spent on outside labor is small, then the effect on the multiplier is also small.

Anderson stressed that a great deal of data is needed to come up with a multiplier, and because the marijuana industry is legally fuzzy, the data might be a little “murky,” as he called it. But he noted that our local marijuana multiplier could be expected to be less than the multiplier for the whole state, as in the Colorado

example.

Anderson also noted that aside from the economic benefit from the marijuana industry there could be social benefits, due to more money available to be spent on education for kids or better housing. And there could be social costs as well.

Today in History: by The Associated Press

Today is Wednesday, Feb. 7, the 38th day of 2018. There are 327 days left in the year.

On Feb. 7, 1943, the government abruptly announced that wartime rationing of shoes made of leather would go into effect in two days, limiting consumers to buying three pairs per person per year. (Rationing was lifted in October 1945.)

On this date:

In 1497, “The Bonfire of the Vanities” took place in Florence, Italy, as followers of Dominican friar Girolama Savonarola burned a huge pile of items considered to be sinful distractions, such as books, artwork, fine clothing and cosmetics.

In 1795, the 11th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, dealing with states’ sovereign immunity,

was ratified.

In 1817, America’s first public gas street lamp was lighted in Baltimore at the corner of Market and Lemon streets (now East Baltimore and Holliday streets).

In 1857, a French court acquitted author Gustave Flaubert of obscenity for his serialized novel “Madame Bovary.”

In 1936, President Franklin D. Roosevelt authorized a flag for the office of the vice president.

In 1948, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower resigned as U.S. Army chief of staff; he was succeeded by Gen. Omar Bradley.

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy imposed a full trade embargo on Cuba.

In 1971, women in Switzerland gained the right to vote through a national referendum, 12 years after a previous attempt

failed.

In 1984, space shuttle Challenger astronauts Bruce McCandless II and Robert L. Stewart went on the first untethered spacewalk, which lasted nearly six hours.

In 1986, the Philippines held a presidential election marred by charges of fraud against the incumbent, Ferdinand E. Marcos. Haitian President-for-Life Jean-Claude Duvalier (doo-VAHL-yay’) fled his country, ending 28 years of his family’s rule.

In 1998, the Winter Olympic Games were opened in Nagano, Japan, by Emperor Akihito.

In 1999, Jordan’s King Hussein died of cancer at age 63; he was succeeded by his eldest son, Abdullah.

Ten years ago: John McCain

effectively sealed the Republican presidential nomination as chief rival Mitt Romney suspended his campaign. Fourteen refinery workers were killed in a sugar dust explosion in Port Wentworth, Georgia. A gunman opened fire at a Kirkwood, Missouri, council meeting, killing three city officials and two police officers before being fatally shot by law enforcement. In Los Angeles, a man who claimed responsibility for the deaths of three relatives opened fire on a SWAT unit, killing one officer; the gunman was killed by a police sniper. After two months of delay, shuttle Atlantis blasted into orbit with Europe’s gift to the international space station, a \$2 billion science lab named Columbus.

Five years ago: CIA Director-designate John Brennan strongly defended anti-terror attacks by

unmanned drones under close questioning at a protest-disrupted confirmation hearing held by the Senate Intelligence Committee.

One year ago: Charter school advocate Betsy DeVos won confirmation as education secretary by the slimmest of margins, pushed to approval only by the historic tie-breaking vote of Vice President Mike Pence. Actor Richard Hatch, perhaps best known for playing Captain Apollo in the original “Battlestar Galactica” film and TV series, died in Los Angeles at age 71.
