Birds don't exclusively drop tail feathers in a fright molt. Pigeons, for example, will fright molt from any and every part of their bodies, though they generally keep their flight feathers. Pigeons are kind of the kings of fright molt. However, tail feathers are the feathers most likely to be dropped for a couple of reasons. First, birds are often attacked from

How do birds release their feathers? Normally birds really want feathers to stay in, but in a fright molt they are able to

While most species of birds can, and do, use fright molt as an anti-predator defense, certain types of birds are more likely to do so than others and have adapted those feathers to fall out more easily. Solitary birds and ground nesting birds tend to be much easier prey and it takes less force to pull out their tail feathers than those of birds like goldfinch which are generally in large flocks. Likewise, predatory birds

Fright molt is not something a bird wants to do lightly! They are off balance until those tail feathers grow back, which takes three to four weeks. While they can still fly, the process is awkward as is landing (they use their tails like the flaps of airplane wings to create drag and slow down). They tend to be very cautious and often “floofed out” while adjusting to their temporarily tailless life.

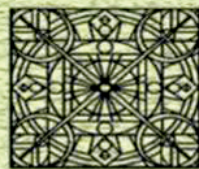
