What NOT to Teach Your Horse

Many people who own horses eventually decide to try and teach their mount a trick or two. After all, who doesn’t like to see a super cute pony pull off a clever trick on cue? Some horses are quite clever and even seem to enjoy learning a thing or two. However, some tricks are best left untaught. These are a few:

1. We’ve all seen the classic image of the cowboy on his rearing steed waving his hat in the air. Sure, it looks pretty cool in the movies, but don’t teach your horse to rear under saddle. Here’s the problem: Most horse owners are not professional trainers or stunt riders. It is not difficult to lose one’s balance while rearing under saddle. Rearing horses that lose their balance will go over either backward or sideways. This can cause serious injury or death to both horse and

rider. Bear in mind that you may not be the only person to ride your horse. Should your horse rear with an inexperienced, young or startled rider, an accident will likely ensue. It is not worth the risk to teach this trick.

2. Horses love treats and it’s fun to feed horses treats. They will even do tricks for treats. However, never make searching your body for treats a trick. Horses can be very mouthy creatures and they can inflict serious bites. If you teach your horses to rifle your clothing for hidden treats, or take treats from your mouth, you are asking for trouble. You will eventually get bitten and your horse will turn into an annoying (and somewhat dangerous) pest. He will not stop at rifling your clothes, as any human will be viewed as a potential vending machine. This includes visitors, neighbors, small children, the vet and the farrier. Most people will not enjoy

being chewed on by a horse.

3. It’s fun to play with foals. They are incredibly cute and energetic. However, there are things they should not be encouraged to do, no matter how cute it is. Never allow them to paw at you and “shake hands.” This turns into striking when they grow bigger and it is very dangerous. Likewise, never let them bound up and rear or put their hooves on you in any manner. Nip this behavior in the bud. The same goes for leaning, laying or pressing on you. If you would not want a full grown horse to do it, don’t encourage a foal to do it!

4. In addition to tricks, there are some games not to play with your horse. The first and foremost is “chase me.” Believe it or not, there are people who like to chase their horses in the pasture. While some horses actually get into this as a game, it triggers a predator/prey fear response in

others. There are also folks who have a horse and a dog, and the two animals chase each other. Chasing, even if it seems fun for all, is unsafe for horses, people and dogs. Horses often become very difficult to catch when they realize that outrunning you is an option. Don’t go there. Additionally, horses often kick out while playing chasing games and you are likely to take a hoof to the head. Dogs frequently go on to chase other livestock, inflict damage and get into a great deal of trouble. If it’s fun chasing Old Paint, why not try the neighbor’s cows or llamas, right?!

We’re not saying never teach a cute move or a trick. There are lots of great tricks to teach your horse. Just use some common sense and always think about safety first. Your farrier, your vet and anyone else who interacts with your horse will thank you!
