### Monday, Nov. 26

\*A window was shattered in the Department of Motor Vehicles office in the 100 block of S. Kerby Avenue between Nov. 21 at 5:30 p.m. and Nov. 25 at 4:30 p.m. During the same time frame, a window in the Safe House Alliance sustained large chip damage. A report was filed for second-degree criminal mischief.

\*A wacko emailed that neighbors were harassing him with an acoustic device, described as a sonic transducer like what a radiologist uses, combined with cell phone apps. This invention scattered the electrical current and drained his phone battery, even when it was plugged in.
