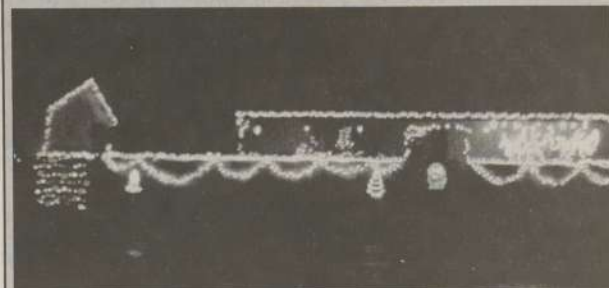
The Lion's Club judged several houses this year and made the tough decision for the top three just before Christmas.

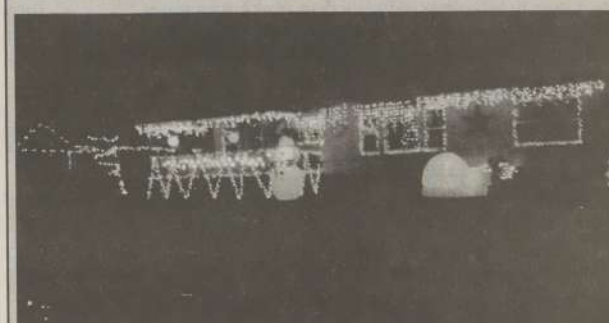
their synchronized flashing lights and music show. Congratulations to all the winners!

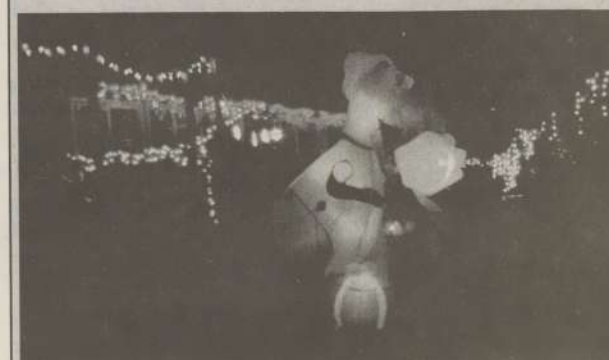
