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I asked her about ISIS and she shared with me information from the exclusive interview she had with General John Allen in March of this year for NPR (which can be found at <http://www.npr.org/2015/03/22/394636772/gen-allen-irans-involvement-complicates-anti-isis-effort>).

Interestingly, she brought the conversation about ISIS back to school sports, marching band, and 4-H. She explained that many of the young men training with ISIS are lost. Many are only second generation. She said they do not have a sense of community or an opportunity to belong to anything like school sports or organizations like 4-H. She says the locals know and understand this but the opportunities simply don't exist.

She has two young sons and says while they have access to many wonderful

things and the opportunity to travel, she would love at some point to move back to the United States so they can know what it's like to be on a school sports team with school colors and all of the trappings. She said she'd love for them to have the opportunity to bake brownies for a county fair or play in the school band.

"They've been to Rome, they speak two languages, they're receiving an exceptional education, but they've never done anything like that. I want them to have the same high school experience I did, to experience a county fair," she said.

I asked her if she had words of advice she might want to share with young people here. She emphasized that many of her colleagues were Harvard graduates and came from powerful families.

"But I certainly did not. I had

\$300 when I went to college and took my horse. I shoveled horse poop, gave riding lessons and wrote for my local paper. I graduated from a state school. I worked hard and I was willing to go places others wouldn't go and tell stories they wouldn't tell. This will apply to anything. You can do anything."

Kevin Cassidy Elected 5J School Board Chairman

The members of the District 5-J School Board were all in agreement as they nominated and voted for the next board Chairman. Previous Chairman Andrew Bryan attended the July School Board meeting via conference call and he nominated Vice Chairman Kevin Cassidy to fill the position he held for the past two years, the maximum for any member to serve in that position. The vote was unanimous, with Cassidy abstaining from the vote. Melissa Irvine was nominated and elected unanimously as Vice Chairman.

Cassidy thanked the other members and stated, "There is some significance to me personally, as 40 plus years ago, my grandfather actually sat right here as the Board Chair for this District. That's one reason why I knew that this was something I could do for community service and I hope that I can help facilitate this Board well."

Wellness Checkups for All Students in 7th, 9th, 11 grades

As the beginning of the school comes closer, the yearly checklists are being double checked. One of the items on that checklist is a yearly physical for grades seven, nine and 11. It's not just for athletes anymore. Dr. Melissa Knutson of the Saint Alphonsus Medical Group spoke on behalf of the several community groups who will be coming together to provide an all-encompassing, comprehensive examination for each adolescent in those three grades.

The comprehensive exams are being provided through 100 percent volunteerism of community members from St. Luke's Medical Associates, Saint Alphonsus Hospital and Clinics, the Baker County Health Department, New Directions Behavioral Health and Wellness, the Baker 5-J School District and more. Some of the stations students will be sent through, such as the Behavioral, Mental, and Sexual Health, are new additions to the yearly checkup and are being provided with the hope to provide early intervention in these areas.

Again, the Wellness Physicals will be available to all students in the three listed grades, and will be provided free of charge. Seventh graders will be seen on Aug. 3,

Ninth graders will be seen on Aug. 4, and Eleventh graders will be seen on Aug. 5. All physicals will be at St. Luke's Eastern Oregon Medical Associates at 5 p.m. for girls and at 6 p.m. for boys each evening.

Board Members Sworn in

Newly elected (and re-elected) Board members Andrew Bryan, Chris Hawkins and Melissa Irvine recited the Oath of Office as they were officially sworn in by new Superintendent Mark Witty. They will each be serving four-year terms as School Board Members.

A very long list of action items followed the Board elections. Most were re-approvals and some were either new positions or had a different employee filling an old position. All items were approved in their entirety, including: appointing Doug Dalton as the CFO/business manager/Deputy clerk and as budget officer, designating the Baker City Herald as the District's legal newspaper of record, designating Clarke and Clarke as the insurance agents of record, appointing Dan Srack as Safety Officer, and appointing Betty Palmer as Title II Coordinator.

Chinese Students and Teachers Introduced

Superintendent Witty introduced Mr. and Mrs. Li to the Board. They, along with 11 of their students, are on a three-week visit to Baker City from Xi'an, Shaanxi, China as part of a cultural exchange program being spearheaded by Witty. The goal for the program is to establish an ongoing exchange, where groups of students from Baker can visit Xi'an, and students from Xi'an can come here. During the introductions, Mr. Li took the opportunity to present a large banner with Chinese calligraphy to the Board and let them know how grateful he was for himself and his students to be able to benefit from the opportunity to visit new places and learn new things. Loosely translated, the banner says, "Virtue, knowledge, energies, and doing the right things."
