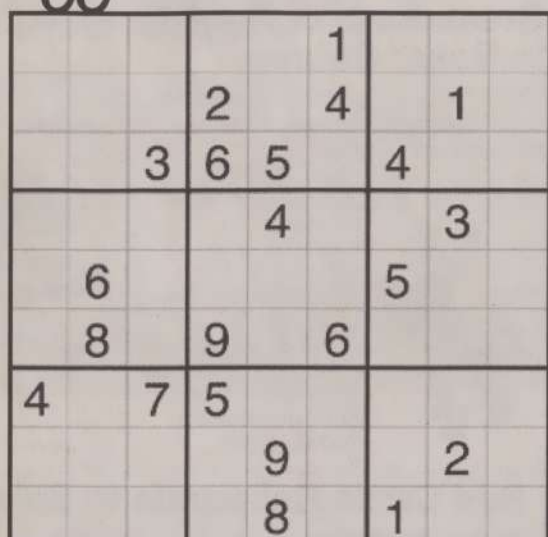
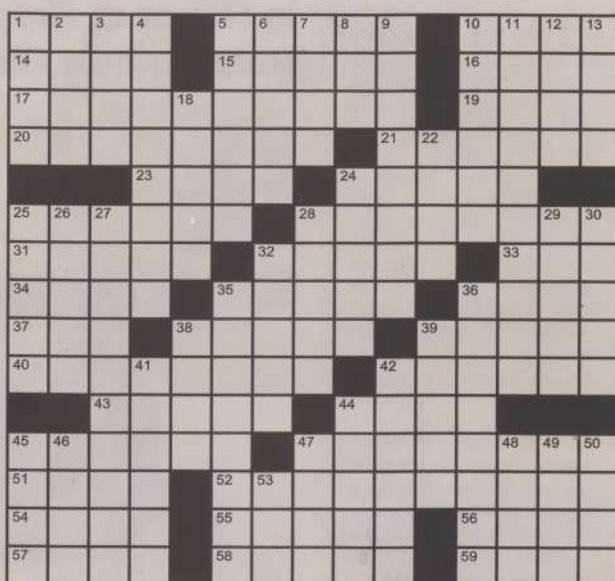

Grande Ronde Symphony Presents Two Concerts March 2

The Grande Ronde Symphony Association will present the annual Children's Concert featuring the musical story of Peter and the Wolf and in the evening will present their winter concert that extends the theme of the Children's Concert to a broader survey of Stories Through Music. Both concerts will take place on Wednesday, March 2, 2016 in McKenzie Theater on the OEU campus. The Children's Concert will be 1-2:30 p.m. and the evening concert will begin at 7:30 p.m.

The annual Children's Concert, under the baton of Zeke Fetrow, will feature the musical story of Peter and the Wolf from 1-2:30 p.m. and is open to all student in grades 3 through 8 in schools and home schools in Baker, Union, and Walla counties. There is no charge to attend Peter and the Wolf. However, they ask that anyone interested in attending pre-register as space is very limited. Russian composer Sergei Prokofiev wrote both the story and the music in 1936. The story takes place in a meadow near Peter's house. The problem is that there is a hungry wolf trying to catch the animals to eat them. Young Peter has a plan to capture the Wolf to take him to the zoo which he and the other animals implement, with help from the hunters.

Peter and the Wolf features a narrator giving voice to the words while the orchestra plays it musically. Each of the characters has a theme played by a particular type of instrument of the orchestra. The characters and the instruments playing their themes are: bird - flute; duck - oboe; cat - clarinet; Grandfather - bassoon; Wolf - three French horns; the hunters - woodwinds and trumpet; the hunters' gun shots by the timpani and bass drum. Peter is portrayed by the full string section including violin, viola, cello, and bass. The narrator for this production will be EOU biology professor, Dr. John Rinehart.

A new feature of this year's Children's Concert will be the "petting zoo" (comprised of the instruments) immediately following the concert. Each student attending the concert will have an opportunity to try their hand at playing a stringed instrument as there will be over 40 violins and cellos.

Each student will receive a booklet of information about the instruments of an orchestra and their sounds and much more. They will also get a special ticket that will allow the student and one adult to attend the evening's full-length concert. Stories Through Music, at 7:30 pm in McKenzie Theater for only \$5.

The second concert will include selections from Romeo and Juliet Fantasy Overture by Pytor Ilyich Tchaikovsky; Night on Bald Mountain by Modest Mussorgsky--a wild thriller which reached mainstream fame in 1940 when it made a startling appearance in Walt Disney's timeless classic, Fantasia; Coriolan Overture by Ludwig van Beethoven that tells the story of a Roman general vexed by his emotions in a tale woven with exile, love and betrayal; and finally, Finlandia by Jean Sibelius with its blatantly patriotic, yet hauntingly beautiful themes that ultimately elevated Sibelius to the status of a national hero.

The pre-curtain Fanfare, where Director Fetrow will relay program notes on all of the pieces being performed, will occur at Ten Depot Street restaurant in La Grande, beginning at 5:30 pm.

Northeast Oregon Agritourism Project To Meet In Lostine

The next meeting of the Northeast Oregon Agritourism Project takes place at Lostine Tavern, Wednesday, Feb. 24, starting at noon. Project leaders, agritourism businesses and people interested in agritourism will discuss aspects of the project that benefit local farms, ranches and tourism businesses, opportunities for training and networking and cooperative promotional activities. The meetings usually run about two hours. Following the meeting, the attendees will go down the street a few doors for a tour of M. Crow Mercantile, a great example of how an agritourism-related business can serve the local community, as well as capture a broad online clientele.

After M. Crow Mercantile, they will take a tour of 6 Ranch. James Nash, who is the fly-fishing guide and handles the ranch public access and public relations, will be our guide. He advises participants to wear clothes and shoes appropriate to tromping around outside on a ranch.

People with a stake in agriculture, locally processed food and beverages, farm or ranch lodging, tours, attractions and other ways to connect visitors with the region's agriculture are welcome to attend the meeting. The group is working together to address the policy, marketing and educational elements that will help increase availability of agritourism experiences in our region and throughout Oregon. Partners and funding resources include Northeast Oregon Economic Development District, Eastern Oregon Visitors Association, Travel Oregon and local chambers of commerce.

"There are exciting things happening in the realm of agritourism, locally and around the state," said Janet Dodson, the Eastern Oregon Agritourism Development consultant. "Local input is needed and appreciated as we work to make the project beneficial for all of Northeast Oregon."
