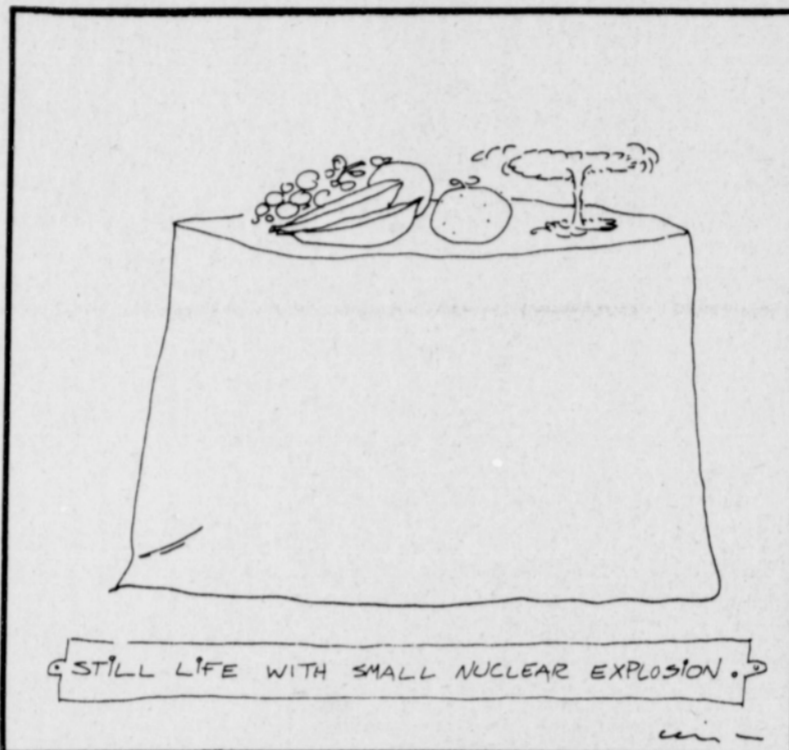
For more than thirty years nations of this earth have been building nuclear weapons, and there are now over fifty thousand deployed, ready for use. This competition in armaments has produced not security or peace of mind, but fear, anxiety, and economic hardship. We think the time has come for a change.

We believe that the nuclear arms race is a local issue. The billions that we are spending for new nuclear bombs and the missiles, submarines, and planes that launch or drop them come from the pockets of taxpayers. Then there are the effects of inflation and high interest rates attributable at least in part to excess military spending. We feel that all this comes at the expense of our real needs: jobs, energy, transportation, education, economic security.

But the local issue is not just economic. Just recently Admiral Hyman Rickover, the builder of our nuclear navy, said that "we will probably destroy ourselves" in a nuclear war. We would like to call attention to this and similar warnings from other authorities and to what this extraordinary peril means to us, to our children, to our communities, to everything we cherish. But it is just here that words often fail us.

A group of North Coast citizens has formed to discuss what we can do about the arms race

and to educate ourselves on the issues. We are also seeking grassroots support for a bilateral US-USSR moratorium on the testing, production, and deployment of new nuclear weapons systems: support in the form of petitions, letters, and endorsements and resolutions from elected councils and other organizations. As the local chapter of a statewide group called "Citizen Action for Lasting Security" we are part of the rapidly growing movement calling for a nuclear weapons freeze.

From time to time we shall be announcing public forums and other events with invited speakers or films. We hope you will watch for these and attend. We are also developing local resources for those who seek information about the arms race and how we can stop it. Please call. Thirteen sites were visited. One observer wrote to the Daily Astorian: "I have learned something about accountability — or the lack of it — and I have learned that public funds are to be spent spraying phantom 'undesireable' trees with a chemical hardly recommended for health."

OCEAN helped organize an educational forum concerning the use of herbicides which was held in Astoria March 19, 1981.

OCEAN, in conjunction with the Oregon State Department of Forestry, has begun holding community meetings to inform residents of spray plans in their communities. OCEAN has persuaded the forestry department to provide for consideration of public comments prior to finalizing proposed spray plans. It has also sought better public access to information and data on herbicide use and more responsible notification of affected parties prior to the use of herbicides in a community.

OCEAN has argued that alternatives to the use of herbicides exist and are economically feasible. One economic study concluded, "given present silva-cultural, technological, and managerial considerations, it is probably impossible to justify most herbicide use in economic terms." (Jan Newton, "An Economic Analysis of Herbicide Use for Intensive Forestry Management," March, 1979.)

OCEAN has persuaded the District Forester to consider bids for manual brush control equally with bids for herbicide control in the 1983 spray season.

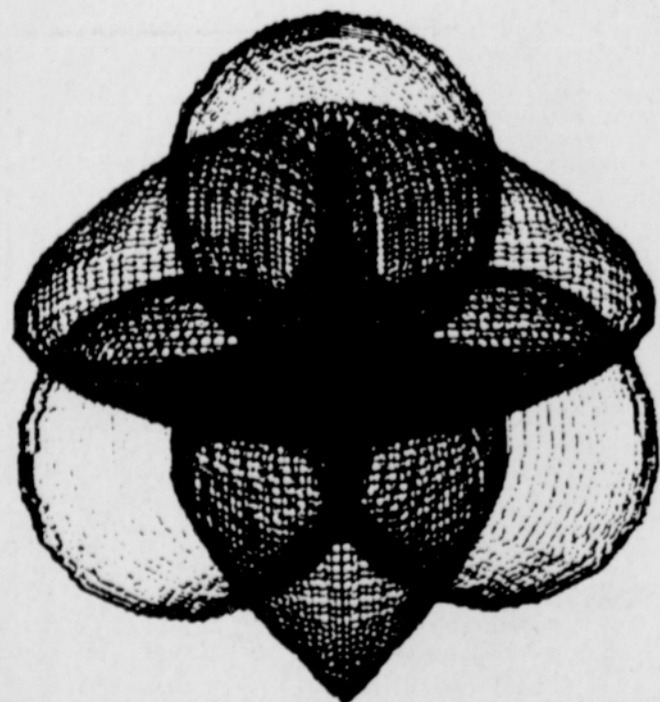
What you can do is contact your local government officials and owners of forest lands and insist upon full citizen participation in the planning and operation of herbicide spraying in your community. You can register your water rights and notify local, state and private forest owners of their location. You can protect yourself and others by insisting on wide buffer zones around streams and open areas; by insisting on notification prior to any spraying in your area; by insisting on water samples from all affected streams; and by insisting that areas having been sprayed be posted with warning signs.

And you can join OCEAN.
