

**WHEN YOU APPLY FOR A JOB**

Several weeks ago we began a series of articles with information that will help you get a job. Here are some more points which you should know when you are looking for work. If you follow these points you will have a better chance of getting hired.

**Get on time:** Get there at the hour you say you will. If you arrive late the employer will think you are unreliable if he hires you.

**Go alone:** Never take friends or relatives for an interview. The employer only wants to talk to you.

**Speak with confidence:** Show the employer that you are interested, but do not talk too much. Answer all questions honestly and do not say anything that you know is not true. The employers check up on what you say, and if you tell him anything that is not true to make a job like you are better qualified, they will find out. Then you are sure to get the job.

**Leave your troubles at home:** Do not talk about your personal problems. Do not get too familiar with the employer, and remember his name is "Mr. Jones," not "Bill."

**Don't argue:** Even if you disagree with what the employer says, you may win the argument, but you lose the job.

**Write neatly:** When you apply for almost any job you will have to make out a written application. Read it over carefully first, and then fill it in neatly. The neatness of your application will show the employer how neat you will be on the job.

**Keep trying:** Even if you don't get the job on the first try, keep trying back. This will show the employer that you are really interested. And, every time you apply you will do better. Try and remember that you do wrong at each interview so you won't make the same mistakes twice.

What about after you get the job? Here are some hints that will help you keep the job and get advancement:

**Get to work on time.**

Learn what your duties are and do the best you can.

ObeY all of the rules and try to get along with all of your fellow employees.

Stay on the job long enough to give yourself a fair chance, even if at first you do not like it.

Learn all you can about the job so you can get advancement.

For immunizations, no appointment is necessary.

**If you apply for training under M.D.T.A.**

**IF YOU APPLY FOR TRAINING UNDER M.D.T.A.**

You need a job. Not just for today, but a permanent job. And what is your skill? What education do you have?

"I have heard about M.D.T.A. and I know it is something that I need," say say. "I must get some education and some training in a skill, so I can get a regular job."

The best answer for you may be to train under M.D.T.A., an O.E.O. project.

When you go to Salem to apply for MDTA, first you receive an appointment for an interview. If you have no skills, you will be considered for the basic education program. Do not be surprised if you cannot get into MDTA instantly. The openings are limited. But when you are accepted, you may begin with two weeks of study in basic education.

Next, the MDTA teachers help you to decide what kind of work you should train for, such as electrical work, farm equipment, janitor, clerk, and other types of jobs.

Most of the training courses require about 12 weeks.

You receive pay while you train through MDTA.

The pay is \$36 a week, plus \$5 per child in the family, up to six children. There may also be some

allowance for transportation. In order for you to receive the training you are best qualified for, MDTA may have to send you to another area.

Through the advantages of MDTA, you and your family are able to live while you train for a steady job. And after your training is over, if you get a job, you will begin to live with less fear of unemployment. —A. K.

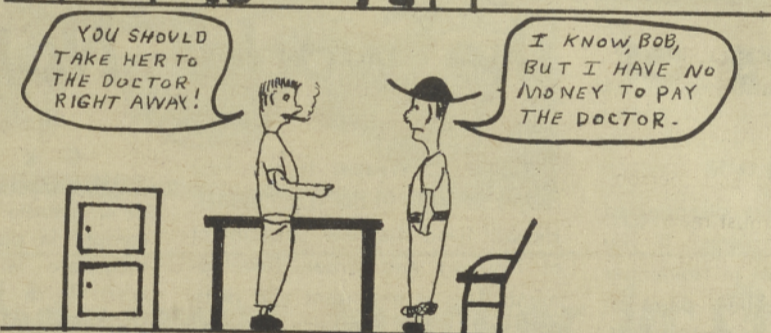

**Cómo está Ray . . . Ud. parece triste hoy, ¿qué le pasa?**



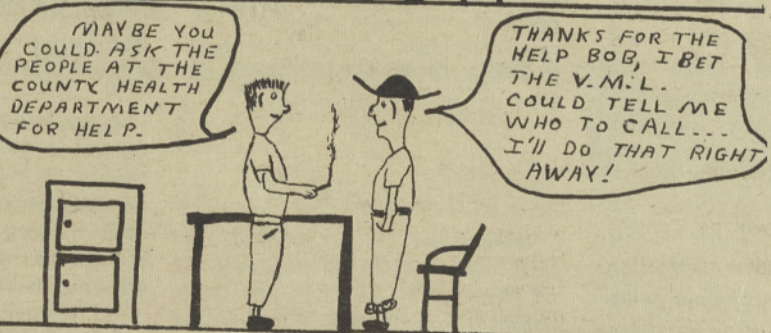
**Mi bebe está enferma con un resfriado y tos.**

**Ud. debería llevarla al doctor ahora mismo!**



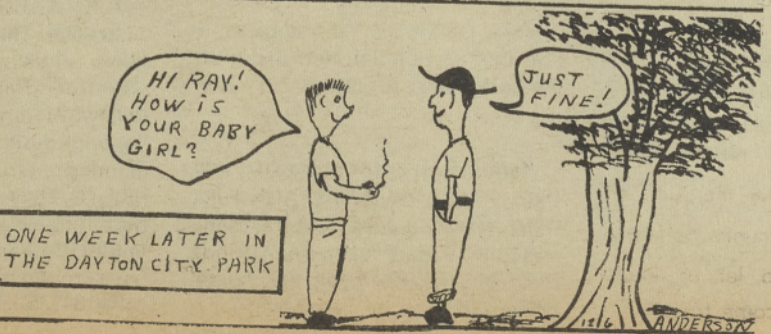
**Yo sé Bob, pero no tengo dinero para pagar al doctor.**
