SHIPWRIGHTS' AND CAULKERS' UNION.

The regular weekly meeting of the Shipwrights, Ship-Caulkers and Joiners' Union last Saturday night, called out the usual attendance. There was nothing of more than ordinary importance on hand. The members are about all at work, and everything is satisfactory.

LEATHER WORKERS' UNION.

The Leather Workers on Horse Goods Union had an excellent meeting at their last session. There was a large attendance, and much interest was manifested. One new member was initiated and twelve made application for membership. All are at work with one exception, and the union is in a prosperous condition.

BEER DRIVERS' UNION.

The members of the Beer Drivers' organization always turn out at the meetings of the union. Last Saturday night was no exception to the rule. President Arthur Hyronius was in the chair. They initiated one new member. The men are all at work, all well, and getting fair pay, and reasonable hours, which insures good work for their employers.

IRONMOULDERS' ANNIVERSARY.

The twentieth anniversary of the Ironmoulders' Union was celebrated by the organization last Thursday night. There were about 40 present. Those present were treated to refreshments, and the evening was pleasantly spent in listening to speeches, recitations and music. Altogether, the anniversary was an affair to which the members can look back with pleasure and pride.

BARBERS' UNION.

A large number were present at the meeting of the Barbers' Union Monday night. Two new members, A. R. Kellogg and R. E. Rusk were initiated into the mysteries of unionism, and there were two applications.

Treasurer Rogers, of the Barbers' State Board, was present and gave the members a good talk on subjects connected with the good of the trade. Brother J. R. Lyles also entertained the meeting with a short address.

News was received and promulgated of the death of Brother J. A. Oliver, who died at La Grande on the 1st, where his remains were buried. Brother C. J. Wheeler was appointed organist. Brother Dave Levy was elected state organizer in the place of Brother J. H. Hutchinson, resigned.

CLERKS' ASSOCIATION.

At the meeting of the Clerks' Association last Friday night seven new members were initiated. A committee was appointed to wait on the merchants of the city relative to opening up during the holidays. A special committee, with Brother Fred Bays in charge, was appointed to look after the secret work of the association. A committee was also appointed to visit the several unions in the city and inculcate the principles of the association and call attention to the fact that Labowitch Brothers' Crown Clothing House, near the corner of Third and Morrison streets, and L. Gevurtz have been declared unfair to the Clerks' Association. A committee was appointed to interview the employees of Olds & King with a view to prevailing on them to join the association in a body.

BUILDING TRADES UNIONS.

The union meetings of the above trades are all well attended, and there are constant accessions being made to their number. Quite a number of the members of the various building trades unions are out of town.

TEAM DRIVERS' UNION.

The Team Drivers' Union had a rousing meeting last Tuesday night with President Shannon in the chair. The election excitement was not sufficient to draw the members away from their union meeting, but they were on hand looking after the good of the organization. Five new members were initiated and several more made application for admission. The union is booming ahead, and its success from the start has been phenomenal. The members are enthusiastic and are always in evidence, when unionism is concerned.

PAINTERS AND DECORATORS.

The Painters and Decorators gave their second annual masque ball in A. O. U. W. hall last Saturday night. There was a large crowd present. The costumes were unique and the hall was a scene of mirth and fun till a late hour. The ball was a grand success both socially and financially. There was \$17.50 worth of cash prizes awarded for the best make-ups, some of which exhibited much ingenuity and originality.

At the meeting of the union on Tuesday night there was a good attendance with the usual amount of business transacted.

TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION.

The regular monthly meeting of Multnomah Typographical Union, No. 58, was held Sunday, November 4, with an increased membership present.

Reports were received from all offices in the city, showing the condition of trade to be good.

One new application for membership was received and one new member initiated.

Multnomah union now has a membership of over 100 members and is constantly growing.

Quite a number of politicians have developed among the membership during the recent presidential campaign, and the "paramount issue" was fully decided in a number of chapels long before election day.

A movement is on foot to bring before the next legislature a number of important matters directly pertaining to the craft, and for the good of all classes of organized labor in the state.

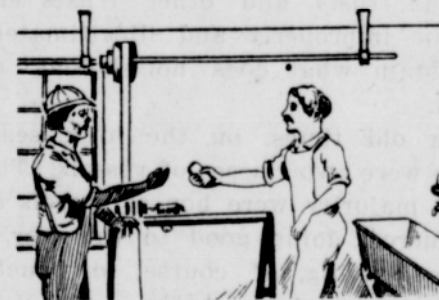
