

## LOCAL LABOR NEWS

### SHIPWRIGHTS, CAULKERS' AND SHIP JOINERS' UNION.

The Shipwrights, Caulkers, Joiners and Carpenters' Union at their meeting last Saturday night voted to affiliate with the Federated Trades Assembly. There was a good attendance and everything is prosperous, though a number of the members are out of work.

### EXPRESSMEN'S UNION.

The Expressmen's Union had a good meeting Tuesday night, with President Spence in the chair.

The committee appointed to see the people who employ non-union expressmen reported good success. A special effort will be made to unionize the entire city and to advance the cause of organized labor along all lines.

### BEER DRIVERS' UNION.

The meeting of the Beer Drivers' Union last Saturday night was well attended. A good deal of time was occupied in making arrangements for a grand ball to be given December 22 in Turn Halle. Theo Eberle is back at work at Weinhard's. The union is thriving, and the members are all earnest workers and in full sympathy with organized labor.

### LEATHER WORKERS' UNION.

The Leather Workers' Union met Wednesday in their new hall in the Union block, with a full attendance. Five new members were initiated, with more to hear from. The union is in good shape, and, notwithstanding it is a comparatively new organization, it is in the front rank of organized labor. The members of the union are all well and are zealous workers for the cause.

### TEAMSTERS' UNION.

Vice-President C. P. Jones called the Team Drivers' Union to order Tuesday night, President Shannon being absent. Most of the evening was taken up with routine business, though two new members, Messrs. W. H. Bird and M. T. Woodward, were initiated. There was a large attendance and much interest manifested. At the previous meeting David Nelson and W. Kassebaum were initiated.

### MUSICIANS' UNION.

The Portland Musicians' Union met in regular session Tuesday afternoon. The principal business of the session was the annual election of officers. Charles E. York was unanimously re-elected president, and Charles I. Brown secretary-treasurer. Fred Konrad was elected vice-president.

The question of joining the trades in holding open union meetings was discussed, and the proposition received the hearty endorsement of the union.

Two new members, namely, L. L. Winters and A. C. Tilley, were received into the union.

### THE CARPENTERS' UNION.

President Velguth, of the Carpenters' Union, is in Tacoma, but he is expected home soon. The members of the union are generally at work, though there a good many "scabs" lying around loose. In response to the demand, quite a number of cottages are in process of erection in different parts of the city.

The Carpenters' Union had a good meeting last Wednesday night, and much interest was manifested in the proceedings. The organization is in a good condition; the only thing necessary is to get those on the outside to join the ranks of organized labor. They are standing in their own light as long as they remain outside the union. They are gradually coming in and it is hoped that before long all the desirable material will be found where they ought to be—in the Carpenters' Union.

### PAINTERS' AND DECORATORS' UNION.

The Painters and Decorators' Union held a well attended meeting Tuesday night. Among other business transacted it was decided to give a smoker December 18, to which the Federated Trades and the Oregon City union is to be invited. The union also decided to establish winter quarters where the men can get together and while away their leisure time in a social manner.

T. M. Dobyms, recording secretary, has resigned and gone to Eastern Oregon. W. McCausland was elected to fill the office during the balance of the term.

The union is in a prosperous condition and doing much good for organized labor.

### MILLMEN'S UNION.

Last Sunday's meeting of the Millmen's Union was a pleasant gathering. The attendance was good, and the matters under consideration were important.

The proposition from the Federated Trades asking the sentiment of the union regarding the feasibility of having a monster union meeting of the labor element of Portland was enthusiastically received and promptly endorsed. The union is in fine condition, and the members are correspondingly happy.

### MULTNOMAH TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION.

Multnomah Typographical Union held its regular meeting Sunday, December 2, in its hall in the Auditorium building. A large attendance greeted President Johnson, who wielded the gavel in his usual happy manner. The session was longer than usual, owing to the presence of some of No. 58's orators and parliamentarians, who occupied more of the union's time than the occasion required. However, the best of feeling prevailed, and a large amount of routine business was transacted. The remarks of Mr. Barry, our delegate to the Federation, concerning a public smoker to be given by all the unions represented in the Federation met with hearty approval. 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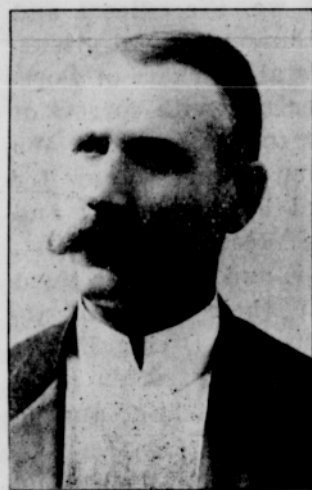

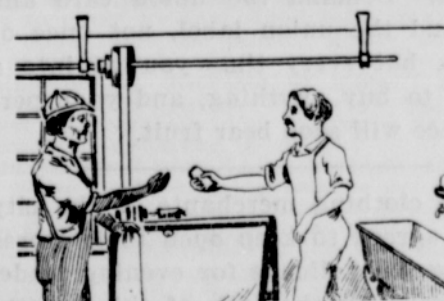
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
