told the whole story. Remington had given him \$1000 and told him to go to Victoria and engage Japanese to work in Washington. Out of the \$1000, \$30 was to be given to each Oriental so as to enable him to pass the inspection of the Federal immigration agents. At Seattle the money was taken from the Japanese by another assistant and sent back to Victoria.

"That \$1000," said the Commissioner, "was designed to act as an endless chain, and if we had not received the information in time all Japan would have been brought over to the United States."

Mr. Blackman said that immediately after his interview with the prisoner he went back to Washington, D. C., and laid the matter before the Treasury officials. Detectives were sent West at once, and their investigations resulted in the arrest of Remington. Remington had a trial at Seattle, and was acquitted. Those standing for acquittal were connected with corporations, and their plea for the prisoner was that if he were found guilty the case would cost him \$27,000 and his imprisonment on McNeill's Island. He had a second trial at Tacoma, and, although it was found that 27 Japanese had been brought in, he was acquitted.

"The time has come," said Mr. Blackman, "when labor must produce the Prosecuting Attorneys and the Judges who will go on the bench and when a case like this comes before them, see that justice is dealt out to the people."

When in Washington Mr. Blackman met Samuel Gompers, who asked him to attend a session of the committee which was investigating the eight-hour law. Corporation attorneys were there and they were declaring that the eight-hour law would drive the firms which they represented out of business. In reply to questions by Mr. Gompers, the president of the Carnegie Steel Company said that since 1897 the pay of laborers had been increased from 5 to 12 1/2 per cent. The mass of the common laborers received only the lower increase. During the same period the profits of the company had increased from 30 to 35 per cent. The conditions were worse than prior to 1897, and the workmen had to organize in order to obtain their dues from such gigantic concerns.

Referring to the women's 10-hour law, Mr. Blackman said that one judge had declared it was unconstitutional. He subsequently learned that the judge was a stockholder in the laundry which had violated the law. In Seattle he arrested another man for violating the

law, and the court gave the same decision as in the first case. The matter is now before the Supreme Court and Mr. Blackman is confident that that tribunal will sustain the law.

In conclusion Mr. Blackman advised all the delegates to do all in their power to strengthen their respective unions, so as to make the Oregon Federation the best organized one in the country.

THE BANQUET.

One hundred and fifty plates were set and every seat was taken. A number of delegates had returned home on the earlier trains, but as it was, there was no room to spare. G. Y. Harry presided as toast master, with the newly elected officers of the State Federation lined on either side. The tables were decorated with potted plants and palms, and the room presented a very refreshing and appetizing appearance. Light wine and coffee was served amongst the other delicacies. After a deliberate discussion of the edibles, 200 cigars were passed around, a complimentary gift from Schiller's Cigar Factory. After Judge Cater, George Orton, Harry Gurr, G. Y. Harry, George Howell, W. H. Barry, J. T. Welch, Jas. N. Murphy, G. B. Thomas, W. A. Alger and others. Songs and stories were a part of the attractions. During the evening a photographer took a flash-light of the small army of convention toilers. The whole affair was brimful of wit, fun and good fellowship, even if the cost was less than \$100, or even \$10 per plate. It was the first banquet of wage earners in the history of Oregon, but it will not be the last. It was an occasion that will go down into the history of the state.

LABOR NOTES.

The Amalgamated Association at its recent convention voted to increase its defense fund from \$25,000 to \$100,000.

Three hundred carpenters went on strike at St. Paul, Minn., on May 1 for an eight-hour day and increased wages.

About 500 drivers of coal wagons, members of the Drivers' Union of Rochester, N. Y., struck May 1 for higher wages and shorter hours.

There is considerable activity among the street-railway employees of Chicago. Six hundred conductors and motormen have announced their intention of joining in a body.

The truck teamsters of Chicago secured concessions for pay for overtime of 25 cents per hour by a small strike. At one time the difference threatened to affect 6000 men.

The shopmen of the Southern Pacific Railway shops at Houston, Tex., employing about 2000 men, are requesting a nine-hour day or an approximate increase in wages.

Twelve hundred machinists and benchmen went out of the sheet and molding mills in Hudson County, N. J., May 1. They demand a uniform rate of \$2.50 for an eight-hour day.

Between 500 and 600 carpenters went on a strike in Paterson, N. J., on April 30. The striking carpenters demand 37 1/2 cents an hour for an eight-hour day, and a Saturday half-holiday.

The skilled mechanics, numbering about 2000, succeeded in getting concessions from contractors in Buffalo, N. Y., sufficient to employ nearly the entire number, on May 1, with a material increase in wages.

The Lyman Cotton Mills, of Holyoke, Mass., employing 1400 hands, closed May 2, for an indefinite period. The mill spinners recently demanded 10 per cent advance in wages. This is believed to be the reason for the shutdown.

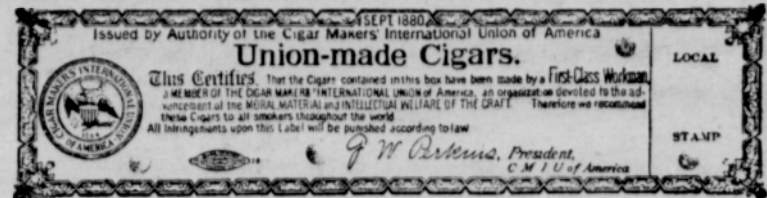
