

Will Leave Her Home.

Miss Helen Gould, who is known as the working people's friend, has decided to leave her luxuriously furnished home in New York and reside among the poor in that city for the purpose of studying their conditions. Her purpose is to take up her abode in the "Gospel Settlement" and come in contact with the every-day life of the congested district. Miss Gould has always given bountifully to charity. The calls that are made upon her from individual sources as well as from the organized institutions, reach annually hundreds of thousands of dollars. The requests by mail for assistance in one particular week amounted to several million dollars. Four miles back of Irvington-on-the-Hudson Miss Gould maintains a home for poor children, called Woody Crest. At her country home at Tarrytown she had for weeks at a time tots from tenement houses as her guests. The naval branch of the Y. M. C. A. at the Brooklyn Navy-yard was built by Miss Gould at a cost of \$413,000. She also built the Hall of Fame at the New York University. To the School of Pedagogy she gave \$5000.

Buy union-made goods and give employment to white labor.

Edward Rosenberg, secretary of the San Francisco Labor Council, has been compelled by ill-health to take a vacation in the country away from the worries and labors incident to his office. During the past year the incessant work and the great responsibility attendant upon the strikes in our city have been too great a strain upon even Mr. Rosenberg's fine constitution. It is thought a rest will completely restore him and in a short time he will again be able to take up his manifold duties.—Labor Clarion (S. F.).

The State Board of Arbitration began an investigation Tuesday of the building trades strike, which has kept 5000 men in idleness in Denver for more than a week, because of the refusal of the contractors to agree to arbitration. The Bricklayers' Union has notified the contractors that its members are willing to work with non-union hod carriers, but the carpenters, painters, building laborers and inside wiremen's unions have reaffirmed their determination to continue the strike until an eight-hour day is granted to the woodworkers at the planing mills. The contractors say that they will not re-employ the strikers until all their unions leave the Building Trades Council, which ordered the strike.
