yet held. Twenty-eight lodges of Licensed Tugmen, including 2400 captains and pilots, who are dubbed the "Aristocrats," applied for affiliation, and were taken in. Amongst others that became members of the L. L. A. were 1500 firemen on the Lakes, 10,000 freight handlers, also sawmill tallymen. The field of operation was divided into districts, each district to be in charge of an executive officer. Mr. Madsen was elected third vice-president out of the nine chosen, and has jurisdiction over the Coast district.

He spoke of the Chicago strike of freight handlers from the standpoint of a personal observer. He thinks that there is a greater public sentiment with union men in the East than here, due perhaps to the fact that unions there are of longer standing and more experience. The reports sent out that the freight handlers had lost their strike, he says, is incorrect. It is true that they did not get all they asked for, but they received an increase of a cent and a half and recognition of the union.

Mr. Madsen thinks Chicago the best organized city in the United States. Waiters, bartenders and barbers are not so well organized there as in the West. The Team Drivers have really the best union in the city.

Mr. Madsen is glad to get back, and says in the fall President Keefe will spend some time on this Coast. A special effort will be made to organize the lumber industries.

TAILORS' UNION.

Besides a considerable list of routine business, 14 amendments were passed upon, including sections providing for the transaction of business through committees instead of the union as a whole, as has been done heretofore; also changing the time for the election of officers to the last meetings in January and July, excepting the treasurer, who holds his office for one year.

The election of officers was made characteristic from a disposition on the part of the union to reject the resignation of President Mickley and Secretary Calkins. But as these gentlemen were anxious to have the honors passed around, they succeeded in getting their resignations sustained. The ballot then took place and resulted in the election of the following excellent officers: President, J. N. Railton; vice-president, Harry Fowler; recording secretary, Edward Peterson; financial secretary, Mr. Thoma; treasurer, Louis Kritner; sergeant-at-arms, John Thim.

One hundred and fifty beautiful badges have been purchased for Labor Day, besides a splendid banner worth more than \$80 will be carried in the parade by the tailor boys.

LOCAL NOTES.

It has been reported that Dennis Mulcahey is to deliver a temperance lecture at the Laborers' Jefferson Garden picnic on the 10th of August.

George Howell, president of Portland Typographical Union, has been ordered by Tacoma by the executive officer of the I. T. U. to adjust some troubles there in the printing trades.

The Oregon City union men are preparing great things for Labor Day. They have just secured 1000 buttons for Labor day. The background is blue, the date and year are red, and the lettering of "Labor Day" is white. It makes a very neat button.

Charles Eagan, formerly a member of the Portland Plasterers' Union, and the organizer and first president of the Building Trades Council of this city, died a few days ago at Hot Springs, Arkansas. He was sent to the springs from Seattle, where he took up his residence after leaving Portland.

Wednesday evening the Blacksmiths and Horseshoers held a smoker at their hall on Second and Morrison streets, at which they served refreshments and luncheon. A number of interesting features were distributed throughout the programme, including a wrestling match and a three-round boxing match between "Kid" Swanson and Bob O'Day.

Frank Carlson, who was killed by a blow upon the solar plexus in a fight with George W. Baldwin last Saturday night, was a member of the Fuel & Sand Teamsters of this city. Frank was well thought of by his associates, and his untimely death was a great shock to his fellow-workers. He was a good worker and never regarded as quarrelsome.

W. C. Booth, one of the active workers in the Bookbinders' Union, of this city, left for San Francisco last Monday night, where he has secured a permanent position with J. B. McIntyre. Mr. Booth will be missed in the labor circles of Portland, as he was a willing and effective worker in the ranks. As soon as he is permanently settled, Mr. Booth will send for his family.

Oregon City people are preparing to come to Portland on the night of August 4 to hear Samuel Gompers, Max Morris and James O'Connell. The Federal Labor Union met last night and decided they would hold no session upon that date, as many of the members were anxious to hear and see Mr.

Gompers and his party. A number of citizens who favor labor organization will also take advantage of this opportunity.

Elsewhere in this issue will be found a display advertisement of the Laborers' Protective Union, announcing that on Sunday, August 10, they will hold their second annual picnic at Jefferson-street Gardens. There will be various kinds of refreshments, both liquid and otherwise. Fox's orchestra has been secured, and at 10 o'clock P. M. the music will start up for the dancers. A gate prize and prize for the best dancer will be given.

Organizer H. A. Duke announces that the charters for the Stationary Firemen and Janitors and Elevator Conductors are here, and that he is ready to install them. Next Sunday, August 3, he will meet the Stationary Firemen at the Bricklayers' Hall, 228 1/2 Yamhill street, at 2:30 P. M., and urges the firemen to turn out and get their union started. The Janitors can also arrange at any time a place of meeting and he will meet them. Unless they call for their charters within a reasonable time, they will be returned.

LABOR DAY PLANS.

The committee of 15, selected by the Federated Trades Council to prepare the means and plans for the observance of Labor Day, met in the office of the Portland Labor Press last Sunday at 11 A. M., and effected organization.

Charles Mickley called the committee to order, and permanent officers were elected, as follows: President, A. W. Jones; secretary, Frank Calkins; treasurer, G. B. Thomas.

Five members of the committee being absent, a motion was passed that any member who absents himself from two consecutive meetings is to be released from further duty on the committee and other persons recommended to the Council to fill their places.

The scheme of a monster parade was the sense of all members present, and sub-committees were chosen for the different departments, as follows:

Parade—G. B. Thomas, C. H. Gram, L. D. Reid.

Ways and means—C. W. McDulin, Grant McDonald, J. K. Stanton, George Hoffman, V. McCullough. This committee was given the privilege to select other delegates who could be of assistance to them.

Messrs. Thomas, Gram and Reid were selected as a committee to meet a committee from the Elks Carnival management to confer upon the scheme of cooperation on the first Monday in September. After considerable discussion and suggesting of various schemes for Labor Day, a motion carried that the regular meetings of the whole committee be held on Wednesday evening of each week at 8 P. M. in the Building Trades Council room, Second and Yamhill streets.

Last Tuesday evening the committee to confer with the Elks met at the office of the Portland Labor Press with a committee from the B. P. O. E., and thoroughly went over the ground of co-operating in an immense demonstration on the first Monday in September (Labor Day).

No definite agreement was reached, but the matter will be taken up later.

TO RECEIVE MAHON.

The Street Railway Employees of Portland are preparing to receive their president, W. D. Mahon, who will arrive here Monday, August 4. The boys have agreed to meet early in the evening and attend the mass meeting at Cordray's Theater in a body. After the speaking a meeting of the union will be called at Union Hall to consult with their chief. The boys are requested to take notice of the late meeting and attend.

WILL GO IT ALONE.

Wednesday evening the committee of 15 on Labor Day met in regular session for the first time, and concluded that the proposition submitted by the committee from the Elks was insufficient to promote a joint demonstration. The committee therefore decided to hold a celebration for and by the labor organizations of the city. The Exposition Building has been secured for a dance in the evening. The proposition from J. H. Howard, of Oregon City, to hold celebration jointly with Oregon City unions in the afternoon was not favorably considered.

A committee was appointed to procure at once 3000 Labor Day buttons, the design being left to the discretion of the committee. These buttons will be sold for 5 cents apiece, and an extra several hundred buttons, better quality and design, will be sold for 25 cents. Sub-committees on dance, printing, parade committee, enlarged from three to seven, were selected and the arrangements will soon be in full swing.

The full committee meets again Friday evening in the Federated Trades Council hall at 7:30 P. M.

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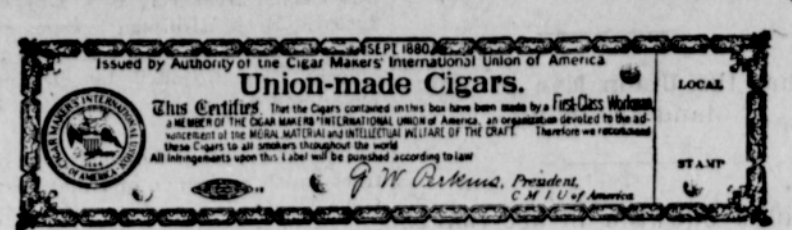
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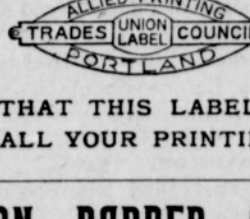

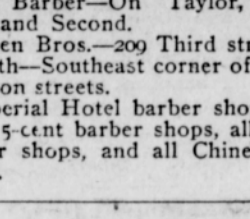
