

MARINE STRIKE.

"In fact," said a well-known citizen the other day, "there has never been a case before the inspectors in which the O. R. & N. Co. are involved, that the other fellow had to bear the burden of the case. If a collision occurs on the river, with one of the boats belonging to the O. R. & N., the costs are thrown upon the other boat, and in case the evidence is clear against the company's boat as to blame, why, then a decision is reached in which both parties are made to stand their own loss. But there has never yet been a case decided against the O. R. & N. Co. since Mohler secured them their jobs as inspectors."

Another thing, as soon as the licenses of the three engineers were revoked, the company immediately discharged their whole ship's crew without giving them an hour's notice.

According to their interpretation of the law, it is a one-sided game in which the employer holds all the rights. If in the test of this law, which the engineers propose to make, the local inspectors of this port are sustained, the rights of an American citizen, as promulgated in the first document, count for nothing; and if the opinion of Fuller, Edwards, O. R. & N. Co. is upheld, the engineers and their friends will lose no time in attacking the law on constitutional grounds. But the engineers do not believe this will be necessary. They will appeal the case to John Burlingham, of the Pacific Coast District, Supervisor Inspector at San Francisco. They think that he will reverse the decision of the combination, as he has nearly all of their opinions in the past. If he don't, the cases will be appealed from him to Dumont, United States Inspector-General, and from there it can be taken to the Secretary of the Treasury, and from there to the United States courts. Anyway, Messrs. Fuller, Edwards and Mohler will have a run for their money.

Monday evening, M. C. Burpee, first assistant engineer; R. Foley, second; and J. E. McCauley, third, followed the example of their brothers on the Elder, and Superintendent Conway proceeded to file complaint against them on the same charges as were preferred against the others.

Conway is a handy man in this matter, and acquainted with the business, as it is reported that once upon a time charges were preferred against him of a more serious nature, which placed him out of harm's way for quite a little while. Anyway, the engineers are not in the least discouraged, and will fight the thing to a finish. They also have a few tricks left that will cause Harrison and his associates considerable worry before the end.

In the last strike there were only three desertions from the ranks, and as unusual as it may seem, the three are Irishmen and well-to-do. William Maher and James Alward took out the Oklahoma, and Mike O'Brien scabbled on the Lewiston. This is no reflection upon the Irish, but it is so seldom that they go into the "scabbing business" that it is worthy of mention.

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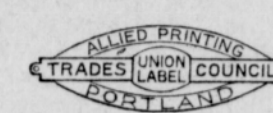
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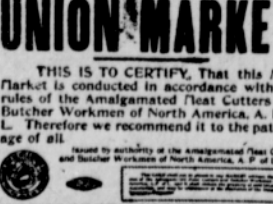
