land Are Doing.

A GOOD SHOWING IN ALL TRADES

A Compendium of the Various Local Or-
ganizations in the City—All in a
Healthy Condition and
Growing.

FEDERATED TRADES COUNCIL.

Meeting called to order at 8 P. M.
President Mickle in the chair. Min-
utes of previous meeting read and ap-
proved.

Communications—From American
Federation of Labor, stating that the
eight-hour bill had passed the House,
and requesting all central bodies to
write the Senators of their respective
states and urge them to use their best
efforts toward the prompt passage of
the bill when it comes before the Sen-
ate; president was instructed to make
the request of Senator Simon, who is
in town, and the secretary instructed to
write to Senator Mitchell to the same
effect. From San Francisco Labor
Council, acknowledging receipt of the
following donations: From this Coun-
cil, \$25; Steam Engineers, \$2.50; Cooks'
Alliance, \$4; Longshoremen No. 205,
\$5. Filed. From Mineworkers, ac-
knowledging receipt of \$20 from Team-
drivers No. 162. From San Francisco
Labor Council, replying to questions
asked about Iron Trades Council of
that city; referred to organization com-
mittee, they being instructed to call
upon the Iron Trades Council of Port-
land, with view of gaining affiliation of
that body with this Council. On mo-
tion for two additional members to ac-
company the committee, A. R. Lawton
and Harry Gurr were appointed by the
chair.

Reports of Committees—Grievance
committee has interviewed the agents
of the Kokomo Rubber Company, who
agreed to write to the company and re-
quest them to come to an agreement
with their former employees, who are
now locked out. Several local dealers
agreed to mention to customers asking
for Kokomo tires that they are unfair,
and to assist by other means to limit
the sale of such tires here. Buyers of
bicycle tires will take notice that the
Oxford and Defender are unfair. Same
committee, reporting on the grievance
of the Marine Engineers, recommended
that secretary write to the Boatowners'
Association and request that a meeting
be called that our committee may ap-
pear before them and see if some agree-
ment could be reached. Secretary in-
structed accordingly. Legislative com-
mittee reported on two bills, one to
restrict the hours of female employment
throughout the state to 10 per day, and
that employers must provide seats for
them; the other to cause street railway
companies to equip their cars with fenders
or other devices for protection to
life and limb. Both bills were unani-
mously indorsed and the committee in-
structed to have them drawn up in the
proper form for presentation at the
next meeting of the Legislature. Special
committee on drydock reported that
the decision of the court has been
against the change of location for the
building of the dock. Committee in-
structed to bring in bill for expenses
for the suit.

Bills—The following were ordered
paid and warrants were drawn for the
several amounts: Building Trades
Council, rent, October, November and
December, \$18; Glass & Prudhomme,
printing letter-heads and stamped en-
velopes, \$11; grievance committee,
work, \$6; Yost Writing Machine Com-
pany, typewriter, \$65.

Secretary was instructed to cor-
respond with the president of the Wash-
ington State Federation of Labor, look-
ing to the thorough organization of the
City of Vancouver, Wash. An adver-
tising scheme was presented for in-
dorsement and laid on the table.

Donations to California Tanners—
Sheet Metal Workers, \$5; Beer Drivers
and Bottlers, \$5 Shipwrights and
Caulkers, \$5; Glassworkers, \$5.

Receipts (dues)—Sheet Metal Work-
ers, \$3; Lumber Millmen, \$9; Beer
Drivers and Bottlers, \$3; Stationary
Firemen, \$3; Glassworkers, \$150.
Total, \$19.50.

Meeting adjourned.

BARBERS' UNION.

At the last regular meeting of the
Barbers' Union, not a vacant seat was
to be had, nearly every member in the
city being present. The principal fea-
ture of the evening was the election of
officers for the ensuing year. The fol-
lowing was the result of the election:

Fred West, treasurer; T. M. Leabo,
corresponding—financial secretary;
Frank Labell, guardian; Frank Hodges,
guide; trustees and finance committee,

Wm. Penson; delegates to Federated
Trades Council, Fred Hackett, Wm.
Penson and J. A. Goldrainer. Install-
ing officer, Wm. Wanner; delegate to
Labor Press, C. F. Sutton.

After the first of the year the finan-
cial secretary will give his entire time
and attention to the welfare of the
union. He will be given a good salary
and he will be expected to keep up the
good work in a businesslike manner.

LABORERS' PROTECTIVE UNION

No. 8724 held a well-attended meeting
last Friday night, December 26, at

which the following officers were elect-
ed: President, T. J. O'Connor; vice-
president, Peter D. Kearney; recording
secretary, M. J. Conroy; financial sec-
retary, Arthur Bier; treasurer, Peter
Ell; board of trustees, Ben Bigham,
John De Temple, William Maxwell;
guide, Ed Lauer; guardian, Charles
Minner. Next Friday evening dele-
gates to the Federated Trades and
Building Trades Councils will be cho-
sen. The Laborers' Protective Union
has developed into one of the most en-
terprising and progressive unions in the
city. There is scarcely a meeting of
small attendance, and the membership
and interest is growing. The Laborers
have also acquired a well-earned rep-
utation as good entertainers. Their
smokers are veritable springs of social
effervescence, and there is no limit to
the necessary liquids and sandwiches.
There is another social feature up the
sleeve of the Laborers' Protective Union,
which will be shown in the near future.

BREWERY DRIVERS AND BOTTLEERS.

At the last meeting, Saturday, De-
cember 20, Local 201 elected the fol-
lowing officers: Al Keith, president;
R. Schmidt, vice-president; C. A. Le-
grand, corresponding secretary; J. Kel-
ler, financial secretary; F. Kuenzli,
treasurer, and Al Bruch, sergeant-at-
arms. Comrades Hyronimus, J. Freah,
G. Schmidt and S. Freah were elected
as delegates to the local executive;
Comrades Schar, Theo. Eberle and
George Schmidt will represent Branch
201 at the Federated Trades Council;
Comrade A. Hyronimus received the
unanimous vote for delegate to the La-
bor Press.

The local paid out \$346 for special
assessments towards the locked-out
brothers of Cincinnati, and donated \$10
to striking comrades in Boston, \$10 to
disabled brothers in the East, \$60 to the
Woodworkers of this city, \$35 to the
coal miners, \$30 to the locked-out
brothers (Beer Bottlers) of San Fran-
cisco, \$10 to Waiters' Alliance of Port-
land, \$5 to the San Francisco Iron-
workers, and \$5 to the Tanners of Cal-
ifornia.

Labor Day expenses amounted to
\$76.60.

All above amounts were paid out dur-
ing the last 12 months.

UNITED GARMENTWORKERS' UNION

Meeting has been called for next
Saturday, January 3, at 2 P. M., of all
people following the trade of garment
workers. The Federated Trades Coun-
cil hall on the sixth floor of the A. O.
U. W. building, corner Second and Tay-
lor streets, has been secured for this
purpose. General Organizer G. Y.
Harry has received the charter and sup-
plies and will be on hand to initiate the
members of the new union, and elect
and install the officers. It is expected
a full meeting will be held and that sev-
eral hundred new members will be ad-
ded. With the advent of the new New-
stadter factory, just about ready to
start, this union will rapidly become
one of the largest and strongest of our
affiliated locals.

TEAMDRIVERS' UNION, NO. 162.

The meeting was called to order by
Vice-President George Henderson with
a fair attendance. Quite a lot of busi-
ness was transacted. A number of can-
didates were nominated for the coming
election on January 6, 1903. Brother
Hallowell brought a kicking horse up
to the union and they drove a faucet in
him and quieted him down.

TO GET AN INCREASE.

The Steamboat Employees met Mon-
day evening and held a very interesting
meeting. There was a big attendance,
and ten new members were initiated.
The following officers were elected:
President, W. J. Barnes; vice-presi-
dent, D. Farrar; second vice-president,
Frank Ford; business manager and
financial secretary, E. G. Allphin; re-
cording secretary, O. A. Darr; treas-
urer, James Driscoll; marshal, M.
Hornbuckle; guard, Burt Grooker;
trustees, J. M. McMahon, M. De
Roschoer, Carl Razine.

The deckhands, watchmen and fire-
men of the O. R. & N. boats report that
commencing January 1 they will receive
an increase in wages of \$5 per month.
The other river transportation lines will
shortly be asked to make similar con-
cessions.

PAINFUL ACCIDENTS.

J. A. Madsen, fourth vice-president of
the International Longshoremen, Ma-
rine and Transport Workers, lost the
end of his thumb last Friday while as-
sisting in discharging ballast from the
French Bark Sorcut, which is lying at
the Victoria dock. His hand caught in
the ropes of the hoist in some man-
ner just as it was being drawn up, and
the accident occurred. While the in-
jury is painful, Mr. Madsen thinks he
will be able to report for duty in a
short time.

J. H. Howard, A. F. of L. organizer
at Oregon City, received a painful cut
across the left thumb a few days ago
while cutting kindling. A physician was
required to attend the wound, and it
will be some time before Mr. Howard
will regain the use of his thumb.

WAR OF CENTRAL LABOR BODIES OVER.

The local labor war at Denver, Colo.,
is over, and in the future there will be
but one trades assembly in Denver.
This condition was brought about by
the ratification of a form of settlement
by the two assemblies, which have
fought against each other bitterly for
the past year or more, the plan having
been agreed upon by committees ap-
pointed for the purpose of settling the
union ways and means of getting to-
gether.

Affiliation was the rock on which the
ship of organized labor foundered a lit-
tle over a year ago. The question arose
over the Firemen's Union affiliating
with the American Labor Union, an
outgrowth of the Western Federation
of Miners, or with the American Federa-
tion of Labor. The demand was made
that the firemen join the national body
affiliated with the American Labor Union,
and then came the demand that they
join the American Federation of Labor.
A dispute arose between the repre-
sentatives of both organizations, which
developed into most bitter antagonism.
The feeling ran high and the strife
spread as far north as Butte, Mont.,
and south into Texas. During this
struggle dual unions were formed and
engendered bitter feeling.

The features of the agreement by
which the two assemblies unite are very
liberal. It is agreed that there shall be
a provision in the new constitution set-
tling forth the necessity of all craft
unions affiliating with their national or-
ganizations, and that a standing com-
mittee be created to induce local unions
to so affiliate. It is also stipulated that
the assembly shall affiliate with the
American Federation of Labor and the
State Federation, and that all organiz-
ers must have the approval of the as-
sembly. All new unions wishing to
affiliate with the assembly must be or-
ganized under its direct supervision.
The question of existing dual unions
will be dealt with by an arbitration com-
mission, composed of equal representa-
tion from each local concerned, and
these to select a third disinterested party.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING.

While assisting a lady off of a Mount
Tabor car at the corner of First and
Taylor streets, Conductor C. F. Prosch
and the lady both fell into one of the
numerous lakes on First street. After
a terrible struggle, with the hungry
waves, the brave conductor succeeded
in reaching the shore with his fair
charge. At last accounts both were
doing well, no fears being entertained
that they would not recover.

The carpenters have organized at
Oroville, Cal., and it is planned to take
in Marysville, Chico, Colusa and other
towns of this section. The flour mil-
lions did the same thing and made
a strong organization.

The demands for an advance in wages
made by the townsmen employed by the
Southern Pacific Company, of Oakland,
Cal., to operate the switch and signal
systems about Oakland, have been re-
fused by Superintendent Palmer, de-
spite the fact that nearly all other em-
ployes of the railroad received an in-
crease in pay. There are about 20 men
employed in the towers in the vicinity
of Oakland, and unless they get their
demands will go on a strike.

A movement has been started in In-
diana for the organization of a National
Society of Farmers. The objects of
the association are to promote and en-
courage organization and co-operation
among farmers, stockmen, horticultur-
ists, gardeners and men of kindred voca-
tions by the establishment of a national
society with such branch and local
societies as may be necessary to
carry out such objects; to obtain profit-
able prices for all products of farm and
garden and orchard; to encourage the
building and maintenance of elevators,
cold-storage houses and warehouses in
the principal market cities of all the
localities where necessary, so that farm
produce may be held for advantageous
prices; to encourage prohibition of the
adulteration of food and the marketing
of the same; to secure legislation in the
interest of agriculture, horticulture,
stockraising, etc.; to secure stable
rates of transportation; to open up new
markets and enlarge old ones.
