In the sincere hope that matters therein, together with recommendations, may commend themselves to your serious and earnest consideration.

That after we have adjourned from the labors of this great gathering of the representatives of the toilers of our state, we shall have earned and deserved that highest encomium from our fellow men today and in the time to come—"Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

Report of fraternal delegates was at the request of Mr. Heskett laid over until a full joint report could be made.

Report of Harry Gurr, delegate to A. F. of L., was read and referred to committee on officers' reports.

Motion by Trummer to appoint a press committee of three: Trummer, Kundret and Duke appointed.

Resolutions were then taken up and read and referred to the proper committees.

Resolution No. 2 was considered by the convention without referring to the committee and adopted to take effect immediately.

Resolution No. 2—Resolved, That rule No. 1 of our rules of order be amended to read as follows: "The regular sessions of this convention shall be from 10 to 12 A. M. and from 2 to 5 P. M.," same to go into effect immediately.—By Trummer, Miller and Parsons.

Committee on credentials here made a report on the credential of John Muelhauser, of Bakers Union, 114, of Portland. Report accepted and delegate seated.

Resolutions Nos. 3 and 6 were referred to committee on law and legislation. Nos. 1, 7, 8 and 10 referred to committee on labels and boycotts. No. 4 to grievance committee. No. 5 to committee on constitution and by-laws, and No. 9 to committee on resolutions.

The following communication from Cigar Makers' Union, No. 202, of Portland, was read and the request contained therein complied with:

Resolution No. 12 was read and adopted by the convention without referring to a committee.

Resolution No. 12—Resolved, That no printed matter be circulated in this hall during the convention unless it bears the Printers union label.—By G. E. Cox and Harry H. Hill.

Committee reports taken up and resolutions Nos. 1, 3, 7, 8, 9 and 10 adopted.

Committee reported unfavorably upon resolution No. 5, which precipitated some discussion. Upon motion

of H. G. Kundret it was laid over until 11 o'clock Tuesday.

Convention then adjourned until 10 o'clock Tuesday.

SECOND DAY—MAY 3, 1904.
Morning Session.

Called to order by President Gram at 10 o'clock. Roll was called and absentees noted. Mr. Ore made statement that William Blackman, president of Washington State Federation of Labor, could not be present, but wishes the organization the best of success.

On motion it was agreed that a limit on introduction of resolutions should be placed at 11 o'clock Wednesday A. M.

Committee reports taken up. No. 6 amended and adopted (see resolution).

Time having arrived, resolution No. 5 was taken up and laid on table indefinitely.

Resolution No. 4 adopted. Following resolution was referred to committee on legislation, No. 13; to committee on resolution, Nos. 14, 15, 19; to ways and means, Nos. 16, 17; No. 18 laid over indefinitely; resolution No. 20 was taken up and discussed by the convention and adopted.

Adjourned at 12 o'clock until 2 o'clock.

Afternoon Session.
Called to order at 2 o'clock by President Gram.

Roll called and absentees noted. Motion to instruct secretary to communicate with Secretary Haywood and give him our sympathy and support; also to send him copy of resolution No. 14; carried.

Motion to reconsider resolution No. 20; carried. Resolution tabled.

Resolutions Nos. 21 and 23 referred to committee on ways and means. Resolution No. 22 referred to committee on constitution and law.

Resolutions Nos. 24, 25 and 26 referred to committee on constitution and law.

Recess taken for 15 minutes. Called to order.

Resolution No. 28 referred to committee on ways and means.

No. 29 acted upon without referring. Laid over to the regular order of business or election of officers.

Resolutions Nos. 24, 25, 26 voted on by roll call and carried.

Resolution No. 13 adopted.

Resolution No. 16 lost.

Resolution No. 21 adopted.

Resolution No. 30 read and referred to legislation committee.

No. 31 to committee on boycotts and labels.

Report of committee on officers' reports taken up, accepted and concurred in. The report follows:

The committee on officers' reports would respectfully submit that we have carefully examined the reports of the various officers and delegates. On the report of President Gram we recommend favorable action by this convention on the following suggestions:

We heartily concur in his recommendation for an organizing fund and the committee on resolutions have given this matter attention. We concur in his recommendations regarding the office of Labor Commissioner, and urge upon the delegates the necessity of giving every assistance and all information in their power to Commissioner Hoff that the next session of the Oregon State Legislature may not undo the good work already accomplished in his department. We believe it to be to the best interests of the State Federation, and its affiliated membership that his recommendation to continue Brother Brock as our fraternal delegate to the Washington State Federation of Labor, and have prepared a resolution for the consideration of this convention.

We have examined the report of Secretary-Treasurer Shaver and find same to be correct.

We find the report of Delegate Gurr complete and comprehensive and agree with the president that the expense incurred was well expended.

The joint report of Delegate Brock and Fraternal Delegate Heskett was carefully considered, and while in error in some particulars, is of great

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
