Mr. J. R. Whitney, who is seeking re-nomination for the office of state printer at the hands of the Republican voters of the State of Oregon, is following a precedent which has prevailed for many years, viz: that when one has performed his duties acceptably and creditably he is invariably given a second term.

Mr. Whitney has certainly performed the duties of his office in a careful, conscientious, and business-like manner, employing only union printers, and paying more than the scale, besides voluntarily conceding eight hours as a day's work, a matter that is of vital importance to organized labor.

Mr. Whitney is a life-long Republican and edited the Albany Herald for nearly 20 years, a paper known throughout the state for its unswerving allegiance to the Republican party and the candidates nominated at their conventions. He is a native Oregonian, a graduate of the University of Oregon, and a practical union printer.

Mr. Whitney is conducting a clean, straightforward campaign, and one that will not require any apologies after its conclusion. His friends are confident that he will be re-nominated without much opposition.

Nothing was accomplished at the Indianapolis conference between representatives of the carpenters and woodworkers to put an end to their jurisdictional controversies. Both sides accuse each other of insincerity.

Pasadena, Calif., has decided to build a labor temple. The unions have taken hold of the idea in earnest. Twenty-seven hundred dollars have been subscribed. No payments are asked until \$10,000 shall have been subscribed and a temple association formed.

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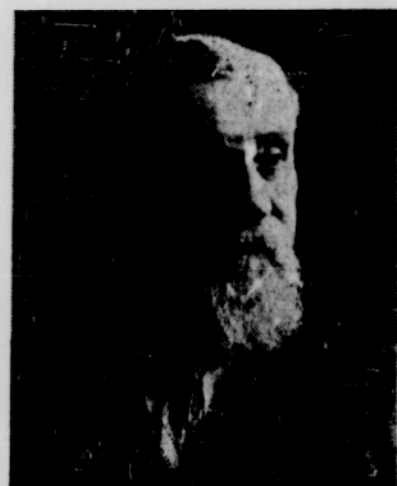
