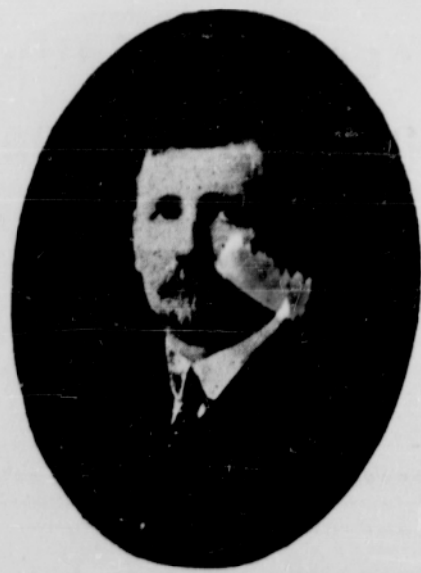

PROPER WAY TO

CONNECT GAS WATER HEATER

TO HOUSE BOILER

TO PROPERLY CONNECT
a Gas Water Heater, four
(4) separate connections are
required, viz: Hot and cold
water, the gas and the vent.

The cold water supply must be
taken from the bottom of the boiler,
through either 1/2 or 3/4 inch galvanized
pipe, and connected to the bottom of
the gas heater, the drain cock being
placed at the lowest point.

The hot water is taken from the
top of boiler, with full 3/4 inch galvanized
pipe all the way, care being used
to avoid trapping the hot water supply.

At least 1/2 inch gas supply is necessary to give best
results.

The heater must be vented through at least a 3
inch vent pipe into chimney.

A good draft is necessary, but NO DAMPER
should be used.

SLOCUM FOR CORONER.



Dr. Sam C. Slocum, candidate for

wishes of the bereaved friends and
relatives in the matter of funeral
ceremonies. I will treat everybody
with uniform courtesy and will play
no favorites.

"As to my platform of 'economy,
justice and honesty,' I wish to say
that I will practice strict economy
for the taxpayers of Multnomah
County insofar as it does not interfere
with the arms of justice.

"I will be just to all parties having
business with the office or County
before its courts and will make it
my especial duty to see that the
laboring man is well represented on
the coroner's jury where one of his
fellow laborers has met with sudden
death at the hands of the instruments
of a corporation or otherwise.

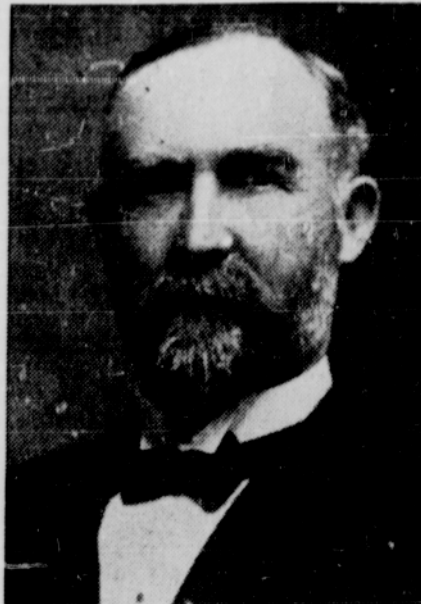
"I will conduct an honest administration

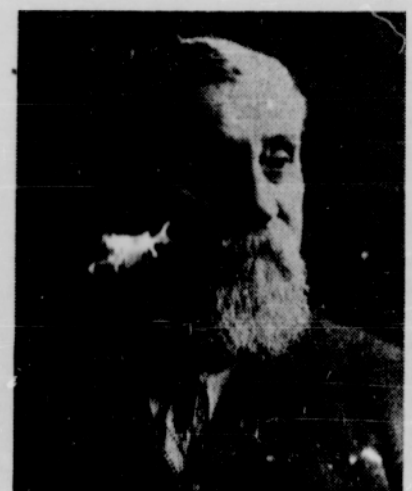

Colonel Gantenbein is 41 years of age, and graduated at the head of the
Class of 1891 of the Law Department of the University of Oregon. For the
past thirteen years he has practiced law as a member of the firm of Ganten-
bein & Veazie. For three years he has been Dean of the Law School of
the University of Oregon, teaching nearly all branches of the law, this work
being most excellent preparation for the position of Judge which he seeks.

In the words of General Otis, Governor General of the Philippines, to the

Philippines as Major of the Oregon Volunteer Regiment, both in the field
