PROPER WAY TO CONNECT GAS WATER HEATER TO HOUSE BOILER

TO PROPERLY CONNECT a Gas Water Heater, four (4) separate connections are required, viz: Hot and cold water, the gas and the vent.

The cold water supply must be taken from the bottom of the boiler, through either 1/2 or 3/4 inch galvanized pipe, and connected to the bottom of the gas heater, the drain cock being placed at the lowest point.

The hot water is taken from the top of boiler, with full 3/4 inch galvanized pipe all the way, care being used to avoid trapping the hot water supply.

At least 1/2 inch gas supply is necessary to give best results.

The heater must be vented through at least a 3 inch vent pipe into chimney.

A good draft is necessary, but NO DAMPER should be used.

German Labor Insurance.

The lamentable lack of employment which during the last year or two, has prevailed at Munich has brought about the formation of a municipal insurance against unemployment, the corporation having decided to contribute an annual grant of 35,000 marks for three years. The insurance is on the Geneva system, which seems to find admirers in several countries. In Munich there has been formed a municipal unemployment fund, under the management of a municipal committee, which is elected by the corporation, and consists of 20 members, ten of whom belong to workmen's associations. The fund contributes partly to the unemployment funds of the trade unions, and partly to non-organized laborers out of work, and who for some time have paid their weekly contributions to the municipal fund. Those unemployed through strikes, lockouts, illness, or incapacity to work, are excluded from help, and, in order to obtain aid the applicant must have resided at least one year in Munich, and either be a native or have been naturalized. The help given must not exceed one mark per day, and not last more than three weeks. An important branch in the work of the new institution is the department which finds work for the applicants, which work the later are bound to accept, or they forfeit all assistance. There is every likelihood of other towns in Germany following the example of Munich, the more so as the system for some three or four years has worked satisfactorily in about a dozen Belgian towns.

THE STATE PRINTER.



Mr. J. R. 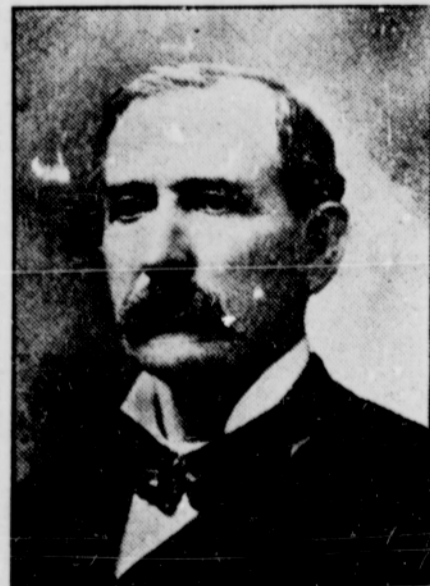


Judge Thos. F. Ryan of Oregon City.

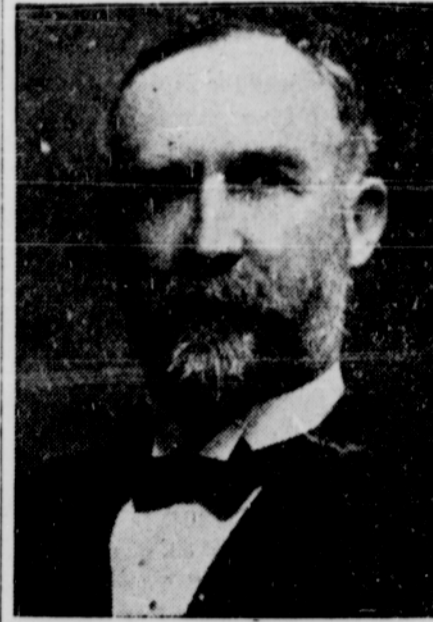

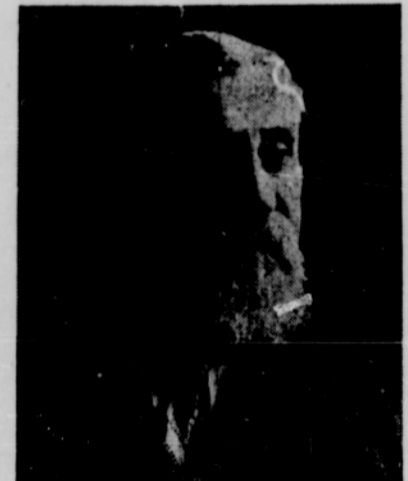

Colonel Gantenbein is 41 years of age, and graduated at the head of the Class of 1891 of the Law Department of the University of Oregon.
