

LABOR NOTES

Labor Commissioner "Billy" Williams, of Minnesota, is a probable candidate for mayor of Duluth.

The Patrolmen of Newark, N. J., will ask that city for an increase in wages of \$2 per week. The city will vote on it at the fall election.

Trades and Labor Council of Birmingham, Ala., has approved the candidacy of Henry C. West, a union printer, and M. P. Chambers, a miner, for the legislature.

The first injunction in the history of Winnipeg has been issued against strikers in one of the iron mills. The people hardly understood the innovation and are quite excited.

Governor Folk of Missouri has sent out instructions to all the state mine inspectors of Missouri to enforce the eight-hour law, which the United States supreme court recently decided was constitutional.

The lockout of 700 girls, members of Collar Starchers' Union, No. 2, of Troy, N. Y., has now been on for over a year. Not a member has proven disloyal and the girls are just as confident of success as on the first day.

There are more members of the Typographical union now working the eight-hour day in Indianapolis than ever worked nine hours; and this despite the fact that the Indianapolis Sentinel, employing 45 men, but recently suspended.

The Amalgamated Leather Workers' Union has signed an agreement with the employers in New York and Brooklyn for a nine-hour workday, time and a half for overtime, and a Saturday half holiday during June, July and August.

The union men in Streator, Ill., went into politics at the last election and elected as aldermen two bottle blowers, two miners, one carpenter and one printer—six out of eight—causing the "boss" politicians to have seven kinds of fits.

Labor colonies in Germany are institutions for the reception and employment of unemployed workmen. The first of these colonies was founded in 1882, and there are now thirty-three in the German Empire and one in the United Kingdom, under control of a central board.

The United Labor League of Alabama at a meeting in Birmingham decided to put out a labor ticket for all State and county offices at the election this year. The league is made up of representatives from every labor union in Alabama, and this is the first effort of the organization to enter politics.

According to press dispatches from San Francisco, the Bricklayers' Union of that city has voted to allow all bricklayers, from whatever locality and regardless of whether they be union men or not, to work on the reconstruction of the ruined city. This is magnanimous on their part and will insure the building of the city without the delay of strikes.

Berlin, June 10.—The German Metal Workers' union is now the strongest, surpassing even the United Mine Workers of America. It has a membership of over 300,000 and the circulation of its paper reaches 307,000. In 1891 the union had 23,200 members; in 1896 the number had risen to 49,900; in 1900 to 100,700; in 1904 to 199,000; and in 1905 to 259,700.

It is cabled from London that the present Liberal government is getting into dangerous waters. The cause is the secular educational bill. The Labor party is uncompromisingly in favor of chasing the parsons out of the school business. The Tories want to keep them at the public crib, of course. The Liberals are inclined toward the Labor party, but in a rather straddling attitude, and a split is predicted with a long chance that Parliament will be dissolved on the issue and appeal to the country. The Labor party occupies a position of great advantage at present.
